Ickleton Parish Council meeting

Extracts from the meeting on 20th September 2023. Your attention is drawn to the following:

Planning information received from SCDC

Reference: **23/03210/FUL** Proposal: Two storey extension to Unit 4 and the erection of 2no. new building for office / research and development uses (Use Class E) together with associated car parking, infrastructure and landscaping. Site address: Abbey Barns Duxford Road.

After much deliberation, although the proposals were generally acceptable, it was resolved to object as there are concerns particularly over the bus stops in a 60mph stretch of road and the associated dangers of people trying to cross the road and enter the site. The 30 mph limit should be extended to beyond the site entrance.

Reference: **23/03108/FUL** Proposal: Demolition of existing bungalow and erection of one and a half storey dwelling on similar footprint (Re-submission of 23/02014/FUL). Site address: 12 Church Street. There are small changes to the plans and it was felt that the objections previously raised still stand and it was agreed to resubmit these.

Reference: **23/00126/HFUL** Proposal: Construction of brick and flint wall and gates to the front boundary. Site address: 10 And 12 Frogge Street. It was resolved to support this application.

Reference: **23/03132/PRIOR** Proposal: Change of use of agricultural building to 1 No. dwelling house (use class C3) and associated operational development. Site address: Rectory Farm Grange Road. It was resolved to support this application.

Reference: **23/02976/HFUL** Proposal: Single storey infill extension, single storey front extension and garage conversion. Site address: 3 Priory Close. The PC were not given an extension although the Clerk requested one on this application and therefore no comments were submitted.

Reference: **22/03615/COND7** Proposal: Submission of details required by condition 7 ((Construction Environmental Management Plan) of reserved matters application 22/03615/REM

Reference: **22/03615/COND5** Proposal: Submission of details required by condition 5 (Construction Traffic Management Plan) of reserved matters application 22/03615/REM

Site address: Wellcome Trust Genome Campus. It was resolved to make no further comments on the slight alterations to plans previously submitted.

Reference: 23/03432/LBC Proposal: Remove and replace render on front upstairs gable.

Site address: 50 Abbey Street. It was resolved to support this application.

Tree Works

Reference: **23/0887/TTCA** Proposal: 1 x large Horse chestnut tree:- Reduce the crown, remove crossed branches, remove deadwood, cut back the failed limb, cut back branches.

Site address: War Memorial Church Street. No comments were made.

Reference: **23/0965/TTCA** Proposal: Ash (T1) - Reduce crown pollarding into suitable regions at approx 4.5m from ground. Site address: 33 Frogge Street. It was agreed to make no comments

Reference: **23/0993/TTCA** Proposal: T1 Ash Decayed - Reduce height, T2 Horse Chestnut Dead - Reduce height. T3 Row of 5 x Limes - Reduce longest leaders by up to 2.5m, T4Horse Chestnut Dead- Reduce height, remove smaller branches. Site address: 8 Mill Lane. It was agreed to make no comments.

Reference: **23/1051/TTCA** Proposal: Yew 1 - Remove tree to near ground level, Yew 2 - Remove tree to near ground level. Site address: 21 Brookhampton Street. It was agreed to make no comments

Horse Chestnut on Village Green

The Parish Council is waiting for a report from an arboriculturist on the condition of the tree. Until further notice everyone should avoid being under its canopy or too close to the tree.

Parish Council Vacancy

Two residents had submitted strong applications. The Council's decision was to co-opt Emily Gittins to fill the vacant seat.

Wellcome Genome Campus Expansion update

Works on the A1301 will begin in January 2024 for 18 months and there will be 30 mph restrictions in place plus traffic lights when required by the works. When completed, the road will be closed for resurfacing for up to 2 weeks.

Wellcome are aware of the concerns that Ickleton is a rat run and that too many lorries come through the village. They have undertaken to instruct drivers so that construction traffic will not be doing this. Regular update meetings are being held, and the developers Urban&Civic (wholly owned by The Wellcome Trust) will carry out leaflet drops.

Some mature trees currently alongside the A1301 will be felled, but at least two trees will be planted for each tree felled.

Urban&Civic have volunteered to carry out small works in local communities free of charge and it is hoped they will be able to repair the skate park.

At the next Parish Council meeting on October 18th Urban&Civic have offered to deliver an update in person to the Parish Council and to any residents who wish to attend. All are welcome.

Coploe Pit work - help Saturday 21st October 2023 10 am - 12 noon

You are invited to join the Wardens of the Parish pit on Saturday 21st October between 10 am and 12 pm to help maintain the biodiversity of the chalk grassland.

The pit contains a wide variety of native plants such as Autumn Gentian and it is necessary to control invasive species such as bramble, clematis and blackthorn that would otherwise swamp the more delicate flora. We will therefore be strimming and raking up cuttings and cutting/digging out scrub. This biodiverse chalk grassland has seen an enormous national decline in recent decades due to changes in agricultural practices

If you can spare an hour or two **meet by the pit gate at the top of Coploe Hill** from 10am. As parking is limited we suggest you walk up from the village, although there is a hard stand parking area beyond the pit further down the hill. We shall have a break at 11 so bring a drink and snack if required. Tools and gloves will be provided but you are welcome to use your own, including secateurs, loppers and spades. Also appropriate work clothing and stout footwear.

This initiative is made possible with the support of the Parish Council. We look forward to seeing you.

From Rev Lydia - It's a Mystery

The Rectory garden has had an interesting year. Some plants have surprised and delighted – we had loads of courgettes and the potatoes Jon planted in bags have been great. But there were the disappointments, too: the tomato plants that sulked, the many seeds that failed to germinate. And we can't always tell why some things grew and others didn't.

There's a story Jesus told about a farmer.* Having sown his seeds, he gets on with his life, working and sleeping, day and night. Meanwhile, all on their own, the seeds begin to sprout and grow, but – Jesus says – the farmer doesn't know how.

If you ever planted beans in jars of blotting paper at primary school (or watched the timelapse sequence in the opening credits of *The X-files*), you'll know rather more about how growth happens than it appears the farmer in the story understands. And yet you may still wonder at the mystery and brilliance of it all.

The Bible affirms our role in making things grow: we hear this at the very beginning, in the creation story when the first people (Adam and Eve) are presented with this whole world of land and plants and animals to nurture and multiply. This suggests that we have a role to play in taking care of the earth, in using its resources wisely so people and animals have enough to eat and can live as well as possible together. In using our skill and intelligence to ensure we do this well.

But Christians also believe that the earth is God's work. The amazing processes of nature that enable life and growth are created and given by God. And they *are* amazing: there's a refrain that runs through the story of creation – at the close of each day of things being made, light and dark, land and sea, plants and fish and birds and animals, it says *And God saw that it was good*. God's work is all good.

At this time of year, in harvest festivals, we celebrate both kinds of work – ours (that of the farmers and gardeners and others who produce our food) and God's, who made this wonderful world.

You are warmly invited to join in the two harvest celebrations in our churches, which this year are at Ickleton on 1 October and Hinxton on 15 October. See website for details.

P.S. In Duxford on 22 October we'll again be at St John's Church, where we are gathering while the building work happens at St Peter's.


ART EXHIBITION & SALE November 4th and 5th

ICKLETON TALKS

Voices rumbled around the village hall as people waited for the start of *The NHS: illustrious past, troubled present, does it have a future?* Organised by Hugh Molloy and Graham Fagg, the Ickleton Talks offer a range of topics presented by specialists, none of whom charge a fee, although the £240 in donations will go to the Macmillan Cancer Support.

Professor Martin Roland of the University of Cambridge challenged the audience with the question, "Who knew the prospect of an NHS was first mooted in 1942 by William Beveridge, a Liberal politician?" At the end of the 45-minute lecture it was strangely comforting to learn that, even on the first anniversary of the NHS in 1949, Aneurin Bevan, the Labour Minister of Health charged with bringing the NHS to the populace, faced an atmosphere of friction and controversy, but also a feeling of great hope. Sentiments that prevail today.

The event ended with a lively question and answer session, which augurs well for village engagement at the next **Ickleton Talks on November 9th**, when Steve Marshall of the British Antarctic Survey will discuss **The Melting Planet: Why the British Antarctic Survey is important.**

Universal Credit

Tax credits, managed by HMRC, are coming to an end, so most people will need to move onto Universal Credit instead. The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) have started sending out Universal Credit Migration Notices, explaining what you'll need to do, and by when.

Kate Robson, CEO of Uttlesford Citizens Advice, said: "We are worried that people will assume they will be moved across to Universal Credit automatically, but this is not the case. When you receive your letter from DWP it's important to act quickly and claim Universal Credit by the deadline you are given, otherwise your benefits will stop and you may end up worse off.

But, beware of being too organised! Don't be tempted to make a claim for Universal Credit before you receive your written notice. If you do this you will not receive protected entitlement and could be disadvantaged financially."

If you are worried about the change or need help to make a claim, get in touch with Uttlesford Citizens Advice by telephone or email.

Trained advisers can check your benefit entitlements, help with budgeting or money worries, offer energy efficiency advice to cut your energy bills, offer support with housing problems, employment or discrimination issues and help you access emergency support from Uttlesford food bank or other local charities if needed.
