#### **Extracts from District Councillor report October 23rd**

#### Heating

Eligible residents are being offered a free electric blanket in a scheme to provide further help for people in need as we anticipate another winter of high heating bills. To qualify residents will be those who are (as of 1 July 2023) claiming Council Tax Support and at least one of the following:

- Attendance Allowance.
- Personal Independence Payment (PIP) mobility element at the enhanced rate.
- Disability Living Allowance (DLA) mobility component at the higher rate

Qualifying residents will receive a letter in the coming weeks from the Council telling them they are eligible and how to claim their free blanket.

#### Streetlighting

There will be a programme to replace the 47,000 streetlights owned by County with LED's The programme will cost £13m over 2 years but will save £2.4m per year

#### **Wellcome Genome Expansion Project**

Caroline Foster, of Urban&Civic, intends to attend the Parish Council meeting, on November 15<sup>th</sup> at 7.30pm, to give an update on the Genome Campus Expansion project. This was postponed from the October meeting.

#### **Wellcome Genome Campus Expansion –Trees**

Residents will have noted that work has commenced to remove trees along the A1301. Below is an extract from an email, received from Urban & Civic, on 13th October:

Over the next few weeks you will notice our contractors removing some trees and overgrown hedgerow, and carrying out tree management works along the A1301 within the Campus expansion land. These works are needed ahead of the start of the A1301 improvement works next year.

The works have been planned to retain as many trees on the site as possible. The trees being removed – most of which are self seeded - are of poor quality and have developed structural issues such as forks and fissures over time. As part of the landscaping work which will take place following the completion of the A1301 improvements, we will be replanting two trees for every one tree removed.

The new planting and landscape work will reflect the wider tree and hedgerow strategy for the Campus expansion, and include species which reflect existing local woodlands, while providing climate resilience and supporting our commitment of increasing spaces for nature. The new planting will include trees of different ages and sizes to produce some instant impact, but also provide more natural layers and variety in the short, medium and long term, as well as doubling the size of the tree canopy over the next 25 years.

Our team have been working closely with ecologists and tree surgeons to plan these works so that their timing minimises the impact on nature. The works have also been carefully planned to take place within the Campus expansion land to ensure there is no impact on the road, and no disruption to traffic is anticipated.

If within cycling distance there will be plenty of cycle parking spaces available. If driving we encourage you to car share where possible.

Note: The footpath from the Wetlands Bridge through to Ickleton Road will be closed for the event from 5pm - 11pm. Pedestrian access will be via the North Gate only.

Vsitors can arrive on site from 5.15pm to allow for parking (no visitors allowed on site before 5.15pm) - food and music starts at 5.30pm.



## From Rev Lydia Music to my ears

I recently had a very musical weekend. Not just hymns (though of course there were those), but live performances. A cello and saxophone duo at Hinxton church was followed a day later by a solo recorder concert at St John's, Duxford. It was delightful, but it made me think about how little I intentionally listen to music these days.

I tend to prefer the spoken word: news on the radio in the mornings, a quick podcast at lunchtime and something undemanding or funny before I go to sleep. But am I missing a trick? There's an increasing body of research that suggests listening to music is good for you. One small study found listening to Bach lowered blood pressure: they also tried

tried ABBA and Mozart but found them not quite so effective. Should our prescriptions include *Air on a G String* as well as conventional medication? Well, not necessarily: other studies have found that the patient's choice of music works better to improve health and wellbeing. So, if you love ACDC more than Albinoni, the research says you should stick to the heavy metal. Listening to something that is familiar and that you enjoy makes a difference. The 12<sup>th</sup> century nun, scholar and composer Hildegard of Bingen writes beautifully about why music is so important to us:

Sometimes when we hear a song we breathe deeply and sigh. This reminds the prophet that the soul arises from heavenly harmony. In thinking about this, he was aware that the soul itself has something in itself of this music ...

She's referring to the ancient idea of celestial music, that in the proportions in the planets' movements there is a kind of music, albeit, perhaps, inaudible. One of the reasons that music is so powerful, Hildegard suggests, is that as we respond to human-made notes, we're in touch with that universal harmony. While we may not be so keen on the spiritual language, there is something in what thinkers like Hildegard express. Music often helps us reach beyond ourselves in a way that is inspiring and healing.


Please come in through the double gates just below the house into the yard, turn left and come up the steps to the back door.

The Melting Planet: Why the British Antarctic Survey is Important by Steve Marshall

Steve Marshall is our local 'Bear Grylls' - explorer, adventurer, mountaineer, rescuer.

Steve grew up in the Peak District, where he was a member of the Mountain Rescue Team and his love of the outdoors was born. He joined the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) in the early1990's, spent 2.5 years in the Antarctic and subsequently became Base Commander of an Antarctic station. In 2005, he was awarded a Polar Medal by Her Majesty the Queen. Steve has many years' experience of life and survival in polar regions. He is currently a member of the Executive Committee of the BAS and is responsible for strategic risk management. He continues to participate in expeditions to the Antarctic.

Steve will talk about his 30 years with the BAS, the importance of its polar operations, and the research it conducts that makes a key contribution to understanding how the planet works and the pressures it is facing.

Expect to be 'wowed' by some lovely photography, polar artefacts, important research findings, and a delightful personal story from Steve.

## **Ickleton Society**

Remembrance Sunday – This year, in an addition to the commemorations, we will be paying tribute to the US airmen who died nearly 80 years ago, on 24 January 1944, when their B17 Flying Fortress crashed off Duxford Road. The plane was on fire and would have crashed on the village resulting in the loss of many lives but for the courage and sacrifice of the pilot, Lt Marco Demara, who, with his clothes on fire and the plane melting around him, struggled to hold it up until it had cleared the village. In total 4 crew members died. A small display of photographs and documents about the crew and the crash will be at the back of the Church for about a week from Sunday 12 November.

**Uttlesford Local Plan** – a first draft has been reviewed by Councillors and should come out for a 6 week consultation in the week beginning 30 October. Unlike the previous plan which was withdrawn following heavy

criticism by the Inspectors, this draft does not contain any proposals for 'Garden Communities' or other new towns or villages. Neither are there any plans for developments at Great Chesterford other than those that already have permission.

Of course, there is a long way to go before this draft becomes final and, in the meantime, developers can continue to make speculative applications such as Icknield Fields for 350 dwellings at Great Chesterford. It is also not all good news as the draft contains proposals for 1280 new dwellings in Saffron Walden and 412 in Newport, both of which could add to traffic through Ickleton heading to and from the M11.

**Survey** Thank you to all those members who completed the survey. We received a response rate of 57%. The Committee has had an initial look at the very helpful responses and will continue to consider how best to reflect them in our forward plans. Fortunately, the majority of members are happy with what the Society does and feel we provide value for money. You may be interested to know that, of members who answered the survey, the most popular or valued events and activities are the archives with the wine tastings a very close second, followed by exhibitions and action on planning and development proposals. The comments made are interesting, particularly those suggesting changes that could be made as well as those that are complimentary and those that are critical of some aspects of what we do. We will be reflecting on all of them.
