Extracts from the Meeting held on 16 October 2013:

DOG FOULING Our Contractor has complained about the amount of dog fouling around the village which is especially noticeable to him when strimming. The footpath from Butcher's Hill to Church Street is absolutely festooned with dog mess and the verge on the right of Coploe Road between the bollards is as bad. Dog owners should take note that their failure to clean up after their pets is making keeping the village tidy a very unpleasant task. Once again we ask dog owners to take full responsibility for their dogs and to respect our village, and our contractor who is carrying out maintenance work.

Play Area and the Queen Elizabeth II Field Improvements The Parish Council is holding £12,000 plus in developer contributions (known as Section 106 money), which are earmarked to be spent on enhancing our outdoor play and sport facilities including Play Area equipment. The Parish Council would like to hear from residents with their suggestions as to what could be done with these funds and any future developer contributions. All suggestions should be sent to the Clerk to be reviewed at the next meeting. In addition if anyone is prepared to be a member of a small group working with the Parish Council taking the suggestions forward, please let the Clerk know. The funds we have must be spent on improving facilities and not on maintaining what we already have. Subject to that the Parish Council is genuinely willing to consider all suggestions.

Potholes Repairs to potholes at various locations remain outstanding. They are on a schedule of works to be completed by CCC Highways. Delays in repairs to rural roads are attributable to funding pressures.

CCC Parish Council Grants for Bus Facility Improvement The Parish Council is going to express an interest in a bid for funding Real Time bus information signs at the bus stops. Further information as to the costs is being sought from Cambridgeshire County Council.

CCC Traffic Survey: A traffic survey is likely to be held in the week after the school's half term. The likely site for recording equipment is at the corner of Church Street and Frogge Street.

SCDC Planning Appeal – S/1220/13/FL – Two-Storey Rear Extension – 18 Birds Close, Ickleton – Mr & Mrs E Farrow. No response sent as the Parish Council was not allowed to make further comments.

**Tree Works subject to a tree Preservation Order or situated within a Conservation Area:
Meeting with Head of Planning:**

C/11/40/054 – 1. Fell Sycamore Tree; 2. Remove broken branch from Willow tree – Riverside, Church Street, Ickleton – Mrs Tina Thorn. Approve

C/11/40/054 – 1. Cherry Tree in front of house requires cutting back as growing over the house.
2. Mulberry Tree – to back of the house – requires cutting back as branches damaging side wall and obstructing windows - Providence House, 6 Frogge Street, Ickleton, Mrs Sophie McKibbin. Approve

Mill Lane Level Crossing: The step up to the pedestrian crossing at the Mill Lane level crossing is very high and it is difficult to get a pushchair over and may also be difficult for some walkers. The Clerk was asked to report this to Network Rail. The Parish Council has learnt that Network Rail is attempting to close the level crossing to vehicles and is seeking more information about this.

Completion of the annual audit for the year ended 31 March 2013: Notification had been received from PKF Littlejohn that they had completed their audit of the Annual Return. The Clerk has put notices around saying the Accounts are available for inspection upon request. The Financial Statement will be available on the village website shortly.

CCC - Local Highway Improvements 2013/14:

The Project Engineer had advised the Chairman that the cost of the Duxford Road build out now exceeded £8,000, which means that virtually all of the budget available has been taken up. Councillors remain minded to have build outs at Frogge Street as well as Duxford Road but there is a question mark over affordability for both in this financial year. The Chairman is making further enquiries so that the Parish Council can make an informed decision as to how the project is progressed

Cambridgeshire Police – Sawston Panel Meeting 7th October 2013: Lewis Duke, Jocelyn Flitton and Glynis Hammond attended the meeting. Inspector Chris Savage is moving to headquarters and being replaced by Inspector James Sutherland from 14th October. These meetings are being reduced from 4 to 3 per year and the area covered will be increased to include Fulbourn and Linton as well as Sawston. The review of the PCSO's is still taking place. The usual topics of Speeding and Anti Social Behaviour were discussed. .

SCDC Review of Districts & Polling Places 2013 SCDC is required to carry out periodical reviews of the Polling Districts and Polling Places. They have asked for feedback (by 13th November) on the present arrangements www.scambs.gov.uk/content/polling-district-review. The Parish Council is happy with the current arrangements as regards both the polling district and where voting takes place.

Ickleton Parish Church - Chancel Liability and Gift Day (Saturday 16th November)

As some of you may be aware, we have been required by the Land Registration Act 2002 to register the Chancel of our church (the bit between the screen and the altar at the Norman Hall end of the church) against 'chancel repair liability'. We are very fortunate in Ickleton that unlike many other churches, repairs to our chancel are 100% covered by the Church Commissioners who, since 1920, have been legally responsible for "keeping in good repair the chancel of Ickleton Church".

We have had to go through a complex registration process to protect this unique and important benefit for Ickleton church, otherwise we would have lost it. Some of you may remember how valuable this was to us when, after the 1979 fire, the Church Commissioners paid £55,000 towards our renovation costs.

The registration process involved searching old land records because the liability for any repair to the chancel related to pieces of land that had once been owned by the Church Commissioners (CC). However on the sale of that land in 1920 the CC indemnified the new, and any subsequent owners of the land, **for ever** against having to meet the cost of chancel repairs.

I hope this explanation helps to clarify any confusion about this matter.

Our church gets no financial help from the diocese, the government nor any other body - we rely only on the goodwill and generosity of the people of Ickleton. Protecting any benefit we can get from elsewhere is absolutely vital to maintain the fabric of the building.

We also need, and greatly appreciate, your ongoing support and that is why we have our annual gift day which helps us to ensure the ongoing flourishing of our church as part of the village from architectural, historical, community and spiritual perspectives. **This year's Gift Day is on Saturday 16th November and if you would like to call in at the Church between 10.00 – 16.00 complimentary refreshments will be available with soup being served at lunchtime.**

RONALD GORDON COULSON 1932-2013

Ickleton church was packed for the funeral service of Ron Coulson on 19th October.

Ron was born at Aldreth in the Isle of Ely. He had three sisters and one brother.

He married Muriel in Ickleton Church in 1956, and was a good husband and father of their three children Jennie, Rosie and Ian. They have six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren, all of whom he was very proud.

He recalled that whilst still at school in wartime, the local farmer (knowing Ron to be a good worker) would bring the school-teacher some eggs, so that he would be marked 'present' in the school register, but allowed to go and help on the farm for the day.

After he left school he had worked for Chivers' Farms using both horses and tractors.

I have known Ron since he came to Ickleton in the early 1950s as he lodged with my Uncle Gordon and Aunt Queenie in Grange Road.

Ron worked for John & Tony Godfrey, doing all manner of farm work, ploughing, combining, spraying and sugar-beeting, as well as plucking many turkeys at Christmas.

As much of the farm work was contracting Ron got to know many farmers in the area.

He worked hard all his life, doing overtime when it was available, but it never dragged him down.

Many of you will have heard his stories of working with Johnny Newton and Joe Bibby at Godfreys - If Ron had written a book 'My time at Godfreys' it would have been a best seller!

His tales were always amusing, but never cruel or smutty, though sometimes he would slightly mispronounce a character's name to add to the effect! Like Johnny Newton he had the ability to mimic other people, though always in a humorous way.

Whilst at Godfreys he once had to drive their Farmall tractor down to Heybridge in Essex and back in a day, a feat in itself, but all the time he had to keep his leg wrapped around the gearstick to stop it jumping out of top gear! On another occasion the rear wheel came off the Farmall near the Cemetery, and Ron was briefly knocked unconscious. Years later Ron bought himself a Farmall, though several of us reminded him to check the wheels before he drove off!

After Godfrey Bros. retired Ron worked 'nights' at Pre-Star at Bourn Airfield as a press-fitter until his retirement, though as he had an HGV Licence he was sometimes sent to Dagenham or Longbridge during the night at short notice with urgent car parts.

In the 1950s Ron took over Billy Mumford's yard at the bottom of Cemetery Lane, next to Fryingpans' Nurseries, where he spent many hours at both work and play for the rest of his life. At one time he kept pigs as well as geese, chickens and cockerels for Christmas.

He was very capable with a chainsaw and for years he sawed and sold logs and would often be seen delivering that urgent load on a Sunday afternoon. All this in addition to his day job!

Ron loved his old tractors, I am not sure if Muriel knew how many he had at one time! (I think he did get into double figures). He went to many local rallies, ploughing matches and road runs with them, where he made many friends, He also enjoyed farm machinery sales and would often pick up a bargain.

Many people knew Ron as 'the man who cuts the grass.' For years he cut the cemetery grass, and until recently the churchyard and village green, though he gave up strimming the village verges when in his late seventies. When he first went to hospital the doctor was amazed that he was still doing a full day's hedge cutting when over 80. He was always down his yard by 7.30 to feed his geese.

On cold days if he was up-to-date with his hedging he would go down Mill Lane to give what he called 'technical support' to Ray Plumb with his mower repairs.

We helped each other a great deal - building sheds and repairing tractors and implements, Ron was always available to give that extra pair of hands. If I needed the odd nut and bolt I would go down to see him. "I will look on the computer" he would say. What he meant was that he would rummage through one of the many boxes of items he had accumulated over the years.

I am honoured to have been asked to write these few words about Ron. So many people have said to me "I loved having a chat with Ron". There will never be anyone like Ron in Ickleton again.
