Extracts from the Parish Council Meeting held on 19th July 2017

The Parish Council wish to draw your attention to the following

1. Uttlesford Draft Local Plan and the proposal for a new "Garden Community" near Great Chesterford. Please see the Chairman's separate article.

2. Wellcome Trust Genome Campus Expansion Plans.

The Parish Council had become very concerned about the lack of any news from the Campus compared with the series of meetings in late 2015 and early 2016. We asked Chief Operating Officer Martin Doherty to attend our regular liaison meeting with Campus to explain. It almost seems as if we are back to 2015.

A new team has been put together to take the Campus Vision forward and develop the masterplan. The Vision document that was put together in 2015 is not being taken forward in its current form and the Campus say they are starting again with a blank sheet of paper. Local communities are to be consulted before any designs are developed. The team's immediate priority will be to consider and respond to Uttlesford's draft Local Plan!

Housing on Wellcome Trust land remains an option. Clearly Uttlesford's Local Plan should have an impact on the Campus Vision. As we appear to be back to square one, all we can do is wait for the promised community engagement to begin, and we will pass on any news or information as we receive it.

One thing is clear. Contrary to information previously given to the Parish Council, the Wellcome Trust has no intention of submitting a planning application this year.

3. Plans for a motorway service area off Junction 10 of the M11.

As you may know, a plane recently made an emergency landing on the field identified for the proposed MOTO service area. Quite what effect this might have on the prospects for Gonville and Caius College's development plans is anyone's guess. Meanwhile, the Imperial War Museum Duxford continues their discussions with the College, which owns the site.

4. SmithsonHill plans for an AgriTech Hub off the A1301 opposite Hinxton

SmithsonHill recently offered part of their site as a location for the Cambridge Food Hub, a project of Cambridge Sustainable Food. This is in essence a distribution centre for locally grown food, some of which may be grown on site. As was the case with Hanley Grange, the site is described as being much nearer to Cambridge than it actually is. The aims of Cambridge Sustainable Food and the Cambridge Food Hub project are in themselves worthy, but Parish Councillors are concerned that in addition to 4000 employees travelling to the AgriTech site, plus visitors and service vehicles, we may need to add the vehicles of a food distribution service.

We remain unconvinced that this is a suitable site for the SmithsonHill proposals, given the infrastructure constraints and the impacts of other projects planned for the area.

5. Sawston Trade Park (Iconix). The owners of this site have submitted an outline planning application for the re-development of the current retail-based operations to form new office and research and development accommodation. The employees on the site would increase from 60 to 1,480 with 670 car parking spaces in a multi storey building adjacent to the vehicle access which is intended to be from the Sawston bypass. The only highway improvement planned is an improved foot and cycle path along London Road Pampisford. We think there would be increased congestion at the A1301/A505 roundabout, and many more people attempting the risky crossing of the A1301 on foot and by bike. This is a brownfield site, and development is acceptable in principle, but we are opposing the proposal because it is too large for the site and we would prefer to see a reduction in the size of buildings and substantive measures to address the traffic issues.

6. Telephone kiosk on Frogge Street

It is sad to report that our taking over ownership of the kiosk was marked by someone kicking in a glass pane on the door. The kiosk also needs painting. This is your last chance to send me suggestions for its future use since the Parish Council hopes to vote on this at its next meeting. Suggestions received to date are

- use as a free lending library (possibly including children's books)
- Move the defibrillator there to increase visibility.
- use by the Ickleton Society as a noticeboard for displaying photos and documents from the Village archives, information about current events and as a mini-exhibition space.

7. Overgrown vegetation. The Parish Council has identified a number of places around the Village for which it is responsible and where trees and/or vegetation need cutting back or removing. This will be

undertaken over the next few months but it has also been brought to our attention that pedestrians are being forced into the road in several places where residents have allowed trees or hedges to take over the pavement. Overgrowing vegetation is also getting in the way of people using some footpaths. Please have a look around your properties and if this applies to you, please could you arrange for cutting back to be done as a matter of urgency.

i. **S/2358/17/FL** New detached double garage with store room The Glebe, Frogge Street (Julian Vargas). Councillors were concerned that previously South Cambs had opposed a garage at this site, but now appeared in favour. After discussion it was **agreed to make no recommendation to the District Council.**

ii. **Application to carry out tree works** subject to a tree preservation order or situated within a conservation area. Providence Cottage, 6 Frogge Street

1. Cherry tree at front of property needs pollarding by 40% as very close to house and inhibiting growth of a yew hedge. 2. Back of house: reduce height of overgrown leylandii trees by 50%. **No objections**

iii. Decision received from SCDC

S/2469/16/FL and S/2471/17/LB Abbey Barns, Duxford Road - Erection of link extensions to existing office buildings. **Permission granted**

ICKLETON PARISH COUNCIL AND THE DRAFT UTTLESFORD LOCAL PLAN

A statement by Terry Sadler, Chairman

At every available stage in the formulation of Uttlesford's Local Plan, Ickleton Parish Council has submitted comments. In particular we have been critical of any proposal for a new settlement just over the border with Essex. Recently, as it appeared more and more likely that a site for a new settlement near Great Chesterford would be included, we have tried to point out the lack of evidence for considering the new settlement to be sustainable, and we have worked with neighbouring Parish Councils in South Cambridgeshire as well as with Great Chesterford to oppose the proposal.

Now it is included in the draft Local Plan for Uttlesford District Council (UDC), described as the North Uttlesford Garden Community, and comments can be made up until the end of the consultation period on 4th September. The Parish Council will make its own comments in the light of briefings we are expecting from South Cambs District Council, who in turn will be submitting their own comments.

We will carry on challenging the evidence base for the inclusion of the North Uttlesford Garden Community in UDC's Local Plan, if it continues to lack credibility, up until the Plan is submitted to the Planning Inspectorate in 2018, and maybe beyond that.

Elsewhere in this edition of Icene you will see information from The Ickleton Society about UDC's Plan, how to respond to it, and about the Action Group that has been formed to oppose the new settlement. The Society has also delivered a flyer to every house in the village with more information. The Ickleton Society's efforts are fully supported by the Parish Council.

What is important now is that as many people as possible respond to UDC's consultation, and I urge you to do that, in whatever way is convenient for you.

North Uttlesford Garden Community

Sadly Uttlesford District Council has decided to include the proposal for a new settlement of, eventually, 5,000 houses north of Great Chesterford in its draft Local Plan. The word "Village" has been dropped from its title as it will clearly be a town, getting on for the size of Saffron Walden (7,000 households). All is not lost however as the proposal is out for consultation and, in our opinion there are many flaws in it, it is lacking in detail, is not based on evidence and is not sustainable.

By the time you read this we expect to have delivered a flyer to every house in the village giving you some guidance on what this proposal means, how you can respond to the consultation and points you might make. If it goes ahead, this town will have a huge impact on our village and the local area, particularly in terms of traffic (5000 houses could well mean an extra 10,000 cars on our roads, grid lock on the main roads and yet more rat running through Ickleton). **So please, please respond to the consultation by 4 September.** Please see a shortened version of this flier on pages 7 and 8. Apologies for the amount of information in the flyer but the draft Local Plan is 344 pages and this will perhaps save you reading it!

Our neighbours in Great Chesterford have set up a **North Uttlesford Garden Village Action Group**. You can join it via Facebook. Just go to Facebook and type *North Uttlesford Garden Village Action Group* into the search box. Then click *Join*. You'll receive updates and see what's happening to fight this proposal. You can also add comments and offer help, advice or expertise.

Opportunity to help with a project

One of our volunteers has been doing a project to add newspaper articles to the Ickleton Chronicle and will be doing something slightly different for us now. Please Act Now

North Uttlesford Garden Community

5,000 houses NE of Great Chesterford

This proposal has been put forward for inclusion in the Uttlesford Local Plan. The Council is launching a consultation which runs until **4 September** so you can have your say.

How will this affect us in Ickleton? For example:

- an eventual size of 5000 houses which could mean something like 20,000 people. Sawston has about 3000 and Saffron Walden fewer than 7000 households.
- building will go on until 2033 and many years beyond with construction traffic and workers going to and fro and associated pollution.
- 5000 houses could mean something like 10000 cars. Traffic through Ickleton and on our local roads will become far worse than it already is.
- pressure on school places, GP surgeries, hospital and other services. The new settlement will not get its own schools etc. for many years.
- proposals for dealing with sewage, avoiding flooding downstream and ensuring water soaks through the chalk to the aquifer is lacking in any detail.
- the settlement will be on the rising ground above the new crematorium and will be highly visible.
- parking at the local train stations will be even more difficult.

Any objections need to be on planning grounds. Here are some suggestions but you can write about issues that most concern you. It is best if you can put them in your own words.

- Uttlesford's housing needs – the new settlement is promoted by Bidwells as meeting housing needs resulting largely from growth of the biotech clusters which are mostly in Cambridge City and South Cambs. However Cambridge City and S Cambs Councils have made provision for the necessary housing in their Plans. A settlement in this location right at the northern edge of the District will do little to meet Uttlesford's housing needs (most of its growth is around Stansted airport), but will encourage commuting to Cambridge, London and the science and biotech clusters in South Cambs.
- Development Framework – the Plan requires development plans to be provided prior to planning applications but these should be available now to inform the decision on where development should be sited. There is no developer in place yet for this settlement and the financial and economic viability of the settlement has not been determined.
- Transport – the issues around transport mean that the settlement cannot be sustainable.
- Detailed transport assessment work has not been undertaken prior to deciding to include the settlement in the Plan. Many of the assertions about moves to non-car travel and traffic impacts are not based on factual evidence.
- Bidwells propose a network of foot and cycle paths and claim that the science clusters in S Cambs could be accessible by walking, cycling, rail and bus services. For most people the distances for walking or cycling are too far and buses will take too long and be too infrequent. It cannot be assumed that the partners of these residents will also work in the science clusters. People are most likely to travel by car. Ownership of cars in this area is significantly above national average – why should it be any different in this settlement?
- There is no N bound access to the M11 at junction 9. The draft Local Plan states that the preferred route for northbound travel would be the A11. However, direct access to the A11 from the site is not planned. As traffic will exit on to the B184 and A1301, rat running through Ickleton and Duxford to M11/J10 (already a problem) will increase significantly. Direct access northbound to the A11 and

at M11/J9 and southbound exits should be a condition for granting permission for the new settlement.

- It is suggested the settlement will not significantly add to congestion on roads south of Cambridge, particularly the A505 and junctions with the A1301 and M11. This assumes mitigation measures would be in place at the M11/A505 and A505/A1301 junctions. While funding is being sought for a study of the A505, improvements could be a long way off. This stretch of the A505 is already beyond capacity at peak times and simply will not cope with the extra traffic generated. Growth taking place or being proposed in S Cambs is also ignored and the assumed numbers of non-car based journeys are unrealistic.
- Essex County Council has made it clear it will not pay for infrastructure. S106 developer contributions are unlikely to be enough.
- Rail stations are too far away for most people to cycle. Bus services between the settlement and the stations cannot be so frequent and reliable as to make them preferable to car journeys. Commuters who choose to park their cars will be adding to the traffic on local roads and parking is already problematic at all the local stations.
- The draft Plan requires the settlement to meet Garden City Principles. The Town and Country Planning Association's guidance states "A Garden City's design must enable at least 50% of trips originating in the Garden City to be made by non-car means, with a goal to increase this over time to at least 60%" and "Garden Cities should be located only where there are existing rapid public transport links to major cities, or where plans are already in place for their provision." These conditions cannot be met. Bidwells have not committed to meeting Garden City Principles.
- Landscape impact – the settlement is being designed to mitigate the impact on Great Chesterford but it will be highly visible from S Cambridgeshire even if building is mainly on the plateau. It will permanently destroy the uplands, the sky-line, good quality agricultural land and add to urbanisation of what is currently essentially a rural landscape which is acknowledged to have high sensitivity to change.
- Water supply, sewage disposal and flooding concerns – Bidwells' responses and reassurances to concerns raised about these matters lack any detail and do not seem to be based on sound evidence. They state that some 55% of the site is expected to be hard impermeable surfaces. There will be a considerable reduction in the amount of water reaching the aquifer on which we depend for our water supply.
- Schools, GPs and other services –the new settlement is planned to grow at a slow rate (about 150 a year). It will be years before the population is such that services will be provided within the settlement. Since existing schools and GP practices are at capacity the new settlement cannot be viewed as sustainable.
- Conflict of interest – Uttlesford District Council has recently bought a substantial holding in the Chesterford Research Park. The draft Local Plan states that the North Uttlesford Garden Community should maximise economic links with Chesterford Research Park. There appears to be a conflict here as UDC is the planning authority for both the new settlement and the Research Park. This raises the question of whether the new settlement's location or the rationale for its existence is based on objective evidence.
