Major developments

Thanks to all who sent submissions on the North Uttlesford "Garden Settlement". It is known that submissions by South Cambs District Council and Wellcome were that it is not a sustainable development. Meanwhile Wellcome's own planning application is anticipated in the coming month.

Ickleton and the Great War The Ickleton Society's project is now complete to produce a book commemorating the people of the village and nearby who were involved in the war effort in some way. It is a very fine piece of work. One free copy per household will be available – but must be ordered in advance (see pages 9 -11 for details and sample pages, and order form on back page).

Parish Council changes (see report below)

Further changes involve **Michael Robinson** deciding to step down. This and the other vacancy have now been filled by **Paul Rose** and **Philippa Harrison**. Thanks to them for stepping up and to Michael for his several years of service.

Please Note:

1. Bins must be placed outside by 6am on designated collection days. Lids on the bins must be closed, or they may not be emptied.

2. **PLEASE NOTE** South Cambs District Council has recently announced the **following changes** to the arrangements for collecting additional waste...

- It will collect **one transparent sack with recycling** (excluding glass – which must go in the bin) and **one bundle of cardboard** - broken down to a size which would fit in the bin if there was space (please tape or tie together).
- Please do not leave cardboard out in the rain. Soggy cardboard gets stuck to other materials making it difficult to recycle.
- Put all other recycling in one transparent sack. **Black sacks and more than one transparent sack will not be collected.** Transparent sacks are available online and in supermarkets.
- Please put **all glass inside your blue bin, not the sack**, for safety reasons.

2. **Black Bins** Extra black bin material will not be collected. It must be taken to **Thriplow Recycling Centre** which is off the A505. Normal opening hours 08.00 – 5 pm (summer opening times). Gates shut 10 minutes before closing time. Tel. 01223 839001

This applies also to extra garden waste that cannot fit into **Green Bins**.

Blue Bins If you often have too much waste material to fit in your blue bin, you can get an extra bin for free by emailing waste@scambs.gov.uk/recycling.

Ickleton Parish Council

Extracts from the Parish Council Meeting held on 15^h August 2018

The Parish Council wish to draw your attention to the following:

1. Vacancies on the Parish Council As reported last month, a couple of residents had expressed interest in joining the Parish Council. With Michael Robinson deciding to step down due to work pressures (and also his increasing Cricket Club responsibilities) we again had two vacancies. Having considered the personal statements submitted by Philippa Harrison and Paul Rose, it was agreed unanimously to co-opt them both as Parish Councillors for the remaining duration of this Parish Council's tenure. We welcome them both and hope that they will find it an enriching experience.

2. Uttlesford Local Plan and the proposed "Garden Settlement" near Great Chesterford. The public consultation stage on Uttlesford District Council's draft Local Plan closed at 5 pm on Monday 13th August. Many thanks to all those who made a submission; as we reported previously it was vital that as many people as possible recorded their objections. Special thanks also to Terry Sadler who spent many hours producing an excellent submission on Ickleton's behalf. Neighbouring Parish Councils also made submissions recording their objections. The StopNUtown Action Group and Great Chesterford, in particular, went to great lengths in support of their submissions, with the latter commissioning a traffic survey to demonstrate what the effect on our already overburdened roads might be. This comes at a considerable cost and Great Chesterford has already spent £60,000 in support of its opposition to the proposed New Town- and expects to spend at least another £40,000 during the next stages. The Plan will now go to the Planning Inspectorate, following which it will go to public examination with Public Hearings scheduled for late spring 2019.

3. Wellcome Genome Campus Expansion Plans. The Wellcome submission to UDC was supportive of South Cambs District Council's view that the proposed new town was not a sustainable development. Otherwise there appears to be little action at present although it is still expected that Wellcome will submit a planning application in September.

4. Plans for an AgriTech Hub off the A1301 opposite Hinxton, and a Motorway Service Area by Junction 10 of the M11. We understand that the promoters of the motorway service area still intend to proceed with a planning application. SmithsonHill are likely to lodge an appeal against refusal of their outline Planning Application, and are maintaining a high profile on social media

5. Conversion of Parish owned street lights to LED. We are very pleased with the outcome of this trial. South Cambs dealt swiftly with the one complaint we received but, if you have any concerns, please let me know.

6. Defibrillator Training. A reminder that this will take place in the Village Hall on **Saturday 22 September**. Please contact Lewis Duke or myself if you want to register for this. Older children and young adults are encouraged to attend.

7. Planning information received from SCDC

(1) Retrospective application_

S/2458/18/FL for the erection of a fence and decked area. The Ickleton Lion, Abbey Street (M Merritt). The Parish Council decided that the proposals would result in harm to the curtilage and setting of the Ickleton Lion as a listed building, harm to the relationship between the building and its setting, and harm to the conservation area. The application appeared to contravene the provisions of the Local Plan relating to Listed Buildings and their setting, and to conservation areas. It was agreed to **object strongly** to these proposals and, in the event that the application was supported by the Planning Officer, to request the application be referred to the District Council Planning Committee.

(2) Certificate of lawful development for the siting of a temporary building.

S/2691/18/LD Abbey Barns, Duxford Road, Ickleton (Martin Bond, Team Consulting Ltd.) No concerns were raised.

(3) Notice of Appeal under Section 98 Town and Country Planning Act 1990

S/0068/18/FL. Appeal reference APP/WO530/W/18/3200033 The Old Vicarage, Butchers Hill Erection of a new dwelling, formation of a new access from Butchers Hill to serve the Old Vicarage together with the construction of a new garage for use by the Old Vicarage and associated landscaping. **It was agreed to reiterate our previous concerns** to the Planning Inspector.

8. Recreation Field Play Area

As you may have seen already, two significant (and very expensive) pieces of equipment have been installed in the Play Area. These have been funded through the tremendous amount of fundraising undertaken by the Sizzlers and their friends, from various grants, and supported by a significant donation from the Parish Council. Of course, the new equipment has shown up how shabby some of the existing items have become. It is therefore intended to hold a "bring a picnic and paintbrush" event, probably in September, to remedy this and to celebrate officially the arrival of the new equipment. We hope this will provide enjoyment for many years to come.

9. Local Highways Improvement The 20 mph speed limit is being ignored by many drivers, even when the Ickleton Community Speedwatch Team is out and about noting number plates and reporting speeding vehicles to the Police. The Parish Council has put in a bid for funding to the County Council, provisionally to fund speed cushions in Frogge Street. We hope to be able to discuss with the Project Engineer the feasibility and design in due course, as well as explore whether speed cushions is the most effective physical measure to slow down traffic.. If the funding bid is successful, installation would be in 2019/20. In the meantime any comments from residents would be welcome.

10. Mill Lane Level Crossing On a more sombre note, we have received reports about near misses on this level crossing, largely due to some trains not hooting as they approach. The problem seems to be more serious from the Mill Lane side since the curve in the track makes it impossible to see the signals, or oncoming trains. We intend to write to Network Rail about this but if anyone has experienced a similar problem, please contact me.

11. Rural Crime

There seems to have been a rise in the level of criminal activity experienced by rural communities in our area. Heidi Allen MP has been made aware of residents' and farmers' concerns and there have been exploratory contacts involving Cambridgeshire Police, the Parish Council, our District Councillor Peter McDonald and others. It is hoped that the Police will be able to become more effective at addressing crime in rural areas. There should be more to say on this topic in the October issue of Icene.

In the meantime the advice is to be vigilant and report anything that appears out of the ordinary

12. Traffic Management Training

Or, more accurately, training to be able to close roads – is on offer from the Highways people at the County Council. This may be of interest if you think you may be involved in a pre-planned event requiring closure of a road in the village. Training is being offered that would provide successful volunteers with a qualification to close sections of the public highway. The training takes place in

September, so there is a tight time limit – please let me know if you are interested, and I can let you know more about what is involved.

13. Resignation of the Parish Clerk At the risk of sounding like a stuck record, please could I again remind you of this impending vacancy. It is a part-time post, working from home at whatever hours suit you best. If anyone is interested and would like to talk to me about it, I would be pleased to help.

Message from our Priest-in-charge

One of the special things that Grandparents are often able to do with their grandchildren is to tell them stories; stories about their own childhood, about their parent's childhood, stories that their own parents and grandparents told them. It gives children a sense of being rooted in a family history that has shaped the identity of those around them and shapes their identity. Sometimes as stories emerge, they explain why something is as it is, why people think and behave the way they do.

As we approach the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War, many villages like ours are digging back through history and recounting stories of the men who went to war and the people who remained at home - keeping the home-fires burning. These are the stories that shaped villages and towns, that shaped and reshaped families as one much-loved member didn't return. There are those too, who returned with body or mind maimed – who returned, not as the people who had set out months before, but changed sometimes almost beyond recognition.

All these stories are important to help us to understand where we, collectively and individually, have come from and who we are. They are handed down to us and we will tell them to our own children and grandchildren.

The Bible is also a collection of books that tell the story of how a people came into being and discovered its identity. These are not 'histories' documenting events as they happened, but stories that explain the meaning behind what happened. Sometimes they are stories about things that could not, or cannot, be understood; how the earth came into being, for example. The stories explore where God was at work and how the behaviour of the people affected the outcome of a situation.

These are stories that have shaped our society, our laws and ethics. Whatever we believe, the Bible has had a massive influence on our lives and our identity. One of the Psalms, set for this morning as I write, says this:

I will utter dark sayings from of old, things that we have heard and known, that our ancestors have told us. We will not hide them from their children ... He established a decree in Jacob, and appointed a law in Israel, which he commanded our ancestors to teach to their children; that the next generation might know them, the children yet unborn, and rise up and tell them to their children, so that they should set their hope in God.

There are many children – and adults – who no longer know the stories from the Bible. There is not a human emotion, a human story of joy or tragedy that is not addressed somewhere in its pages. The Bible speaks into some of the most difficult situations today: personal, political, local and international. It shows how corruption and selfishness can bring people down and how love is stronger than hate, more powerful than death.

And so, in September, we are beginning a new programme of activities for children in church. At three of our 10 am services in a month there will be storytelling, crafts, singing and talking. It's called 'al2gether on Sundays', is suitable for children aged 2-9 and all are welcome. Also in September there

will be a new programme for 'Youthinc' for 9+ on the second Sunday of each month at 6 pm. For dates and venues for 'al2gether' and 'Youthinc' please check the website www.hinkledux.com or for more information, please email petra@hinkledux.com

Of course, stories are not only for children, so we also have a course of conversations based on Mark's Gospel called 'Unlocking the Word'. These are on Tuesday mornings, 11th & 25th September, 9th & 23rd October and 13th & 27th November at the Rectory, 13, St John's Street, Duxford. We will begin with coffee/tea and cake. There is no need for any expertise and no question is too silly. It's about listening to the story, sharing insights and seeing how relevant the Bible is for us today. ALL ARE WELCOME.

Tribute to the men and women of Ickleton who contributed to the war effort – Village Hall,
Saturday 10 November, 11am to 4pm**

As you’ll have read in previous editions, the Ickleton Society has been working on a project to make a record of all the people who were born or lived in the village who contributed in some way to the war effort as well as those from neighbouring villages who worked for the Ickleton Red Cross Hospital. Our aim, as we come to the centenary of the armistice and the end of that war, is to pay tribute to them and celebrate their lives and how a small rural village stepped up to the plate

We will be publishing a fabulous book full of background about the village at that time, the local regiments, how men were recruited into the armed forces, what happened to them if they were wounded, the setting up of the Ickleton Red Cross Hospital and information about the lives of the 200 or so people we’ve traced who went to war or served in some way on the home front, including the many women who volunteered at the Red Cross Hospital. It will be illustrated with lots of photographs, information taken from military and Red Cross records and, where we know which battalion men served with, details of the battles they were in. If you live in a house built by 1910, you’ll be able to find out if any of these people lived there.

The draft book has impressed South Cambridgeshire District Council so much that we have won a very generous grant from their Community Chest towards the cost of printing the book. The Wellcome Genome Campus is also making a very generous donation to these costs. As a result, we should have quite a large number of copies which we’ll be giving to, in order of priority, local schools and libraries, people who have helped us with the project, descendants of people in the book, Ickleton Society members and residents of the village.

On Saturday 10 November in the Village Hall we’ll be holding an exhibition about the people in the book and the village during WW1 and copies of the book will be available for collection between 11am and 3pm (more information about the exhibition and other tributes next month). **You must please order your copy in advance by completing the tear off slip [see back page]. Only one free copy per Ickleton household and only one free copy per family of descendants can be ordered** (more copies will be available to purchase but we don’t know the cost yet). To tempt you we’re including a few snippets in this edition of Icene – see the following two pages (there’s a lot more detail in the book), and over the next few weeks, we’ll be putting some more on our Facebook page and on the notice board next to the shop together with a list of the names of the people featured in the book. If you know of any descendants please let them know what’s happening.
