Please Note:

1. As mentioned last month we are now back to fortnightly collections of our green bins. Also, please note that **from 1 April 2019** SCDC will introduce a charge of £20 each from then until 30 September 2019 for any second and subsequent green bins per household. This charge changes to £35 per bin annually on 1 October 2019.

2. The summer schedule comes into operation at the Thriplow recycling plant on 1 April so the closing time during March reverts to 5pm with the gates closing 10 minutes beforehand.

Ickleton Parish Council

Extracts from the Parish Council Meeting held on 20th February 2019

The Parish Council wish to draw your attention to the following:

1. Uttlesford Local Plan and the proposed "Garden Settlement" near Great Chesterford

All local Parish Councils continue to make strong representations in opposition to this proposed development. We now wait to see the outcome of the consultation exercise on Uttlesford's Sustainability Appraisal and how the Local Plan is received by the Planning Inspectors.

2. Wellcome Genome Campus Expansion Plans

It appears that the Wellcome Planning application is likely to be considered at an extraordinary meeting of the SCDC Planning Committee, possibly on 17 April.

3. Plans for an AgriTech Park off the A1301 opposite Hinxton

Our District Councillor Peter McDonald has launched a petition against the calling in of Smithson Hill's Appeal by the Secretary of State. He feels it is wrong that a Government Minister should put himself in the position of deciding on this development, and is able to decline to meet with Parish Councillors whilst SmithsonHill continues to lobby politicians to support them. If you wish to support Peter

McDonald's petition it is at https://www.sclibdems.org.uk/hinxton_agritech_petition_2 Although the petition has been organised by local Liberal Democrats, anyone signing it can opt out of further contact from them.

4. Local Highways Improvement Funding 2019-2020

We are very pleased to report that our bid for funds has been successful. To slow traffic down on Frogge Street a priority build out will be constructed between the existing priority system at the Frogge Street entrance to the Village and the junction with Church Street We don't have a timetable yet for when the work will be done but will keep you informed as soon as we hear anything.

5. Other traffic news. As you may have seen, the Speedwatch Team is very much back in action as the Cambridgeshire Police have provided us with replacement equipment. Over 400 vehicles have been reported to the Police for speeding since the beginning of this year.

6. Planning information received from SCDC

(i) For consideration

S/0713/19/FL Installation of two flues at the Bridget Ogilvie Building, Wellcome Genome Campus (Mr D Parsley). It was agreed to support this application and to recommend that it be approved.

(ii) County Council Consultation The 2019 revised Local Validation Guidance List and the Local Validation Check List for planning applications for the County Council's own development and for waste development had been circulated for comment. It was agreed that no response would be made.

7. Kern Roberts We were sad to learn of Kern's recent death and will remember him for his valuable contribution to Ickleton Parish Council during the time he lived in Ickleton.

Reflections from the Rectory

With a month or two to reflect on our pilgrimage to the Holy Land, the beginning of Lent has left me thinking very much about the strange landscape that is the Judean Wilderness. It is, of course, the landscape that Jesus is led to and where he spends forty days and nights being tempted by the devil. These are the forty days and nights of Lent that the church observes before Easter

The Judean wilderness is the strangest landscape I have ever seen; mile after mile of dry hills stretch out, cut across with meandering pathways and wadis. Apparently the local Bedouin tribes know some these pathways and where they lead, but otherwise the landscape speaks only of lostness, isolation, disorientation, hunger and thirst. And this land seems to me to be a suitable metaphor for that kind of inner wilderness Jesus must have felt, tempted as he was by the things we are all tempted by; wealth, power, status – the things that speak of success in the material world.

It's hard not to have our heads turned by these things; material success gives rise to our sense of identity. The shiny new Porsche or the row of designer handbags tell the world how successful we are and we can soon believe that our identity is determined by what we have achieved in terms of status and wealth. Money and power are heady things. In the Old Testament, the prophets warn of the consequences of 'worshipping idols'. There are many paths into the wilderness and temptation is at every turn.

It also seems to me that it's a jolly good metaphor for where we are now politically in this country. I am writing just days before the Brexit 'deadline' and, whatever your views on the referendum, the whole thing has become a complete fiasco; following paths that go round in circles, or to dead ends. It has left the country more divided and dissatisfied than it was before and many other political issues have been put on the back-burner for far too long to the detriment of vital provisions like health, education and policing, to name but a few. History will eventually give us the full cost of these years, not only in terms of economics, and I suspect we're in for a longer time in the wilderness yet.

However, it's in the wilderness that we very often discover who we are. The devil keeps saying to Jesus, "If you are the Son of God, then do ... such and such." and Jesus says "I am the son of God – but I don't do that, I do this." He remains true to his identity. He is not swayed or led astray by the flattery and temptation the devil lays in front of him. Whether you read this as a believer, a doubter or a non-believer, it's a story that demonstrates that if we allow our heads to be turned, if we turn away from that which is good and right and true, then we lose ourselves somehow.

Jesus resists. His story ends with the most cataclysmic failure in terms of worldly success and he is executed as a common criminal on the cross between two thieves. One taunts him, the other recognises he is blameless. To him Jesus says, "Today you will be with me in Paradise." There is nothing that cannot be used, no experience that cannot be learned through, no situation that cannot be healed. In the end, all things can be turned around and God brings life out of death on Easter morning. In church we will be coming out of the 'wilderness' on Palm Sunday to tell the Easter Story (part 1) beginning at St John's church in Duxford. From there, there will be a Palm Procession down to St Peter's church for the rest of the story. Please do come and join us – it's not quite Oberammergau, but close! Please see below for other activities and services. And- when it comes, a very Happy and blessed Easter.

Colin reminded us of how birds feature prominently in music, literature and poetry as well as art, before discussing the migration of kestrels, cuckoos, and house martins, and the current pressure worldwide just for birds to survive. Many bird species are low on numbers due to world population growth, general farming practices, climate change and the loss of many old hedgerows in England. Colin indicated ways in which we could help wildlife in our own gardens by planting native species, creating wild areas and green corridors in the garden to allow wildlife access to food.

Following a lively discussion, Colin judged the Monthly Competition – a brilliant selection of Spring Flowers and **won by Gerry Birch with a Hellebore**. Second: **Jos Flitton - Pink Camelia** and Third **Ann Warren - Chionodoxa (Glory of the Snow)**.

Thanks once again to Clare Driver for organising our annual litter pick and to everyone who turned up on the day in spite of it being cold, damp and windy.

Did You Know? WW2 Plane Crashes 75 years ago

You may have heard about the fly-past over Sheffield in February to honour the crew of a WW2 B17 Flying Fortress who died when they crashed into woodland in a park. They were attempting an emergency landing in the park but diverted to avoid a group of children.

It reminded me that Ickleton also has every reason to be thankful to an American aircrew of a B17 which came over the village on fire. The aircraft had been about an hour into a raid when there was a malfunction on board which caused a fire that the crew were unable to extinguish. They managed to push the top turret gunner, who was on fire, out of the plane and he survived. Five others baled out just before Ickleton. The pilot, Captain Marco de Mara (promoted that morning), managed to hold the plane up while it cleared Abbey Street and tried to land in a field to save the others who were too badly injured to bale out. The pilot was said to be on fire and the plane was melting around them. The plane crashed just beyond the end of Abbey Street. Four crew members died – the pilot, co-pilot, bombardier and toggeler. Three died in the aircraft and one who baled out at the last moment whilst on fire, died as he hit the ground. The pilot and toggeler are buried at the American Cemetery at Madingley.

On 21 July 1944 a P51 Mustang crashed at Valance Farm though the pilot managed to bale out and survived.
