1. With effect from 1 April 2019 South Cambs DC introduced a charge of £20 each from then until 30 September 2019 for a second and subsequent green bin per household. This charge changes to £35 per additional bin annually from 1 October 2019. Unless the correct authorisation is displayed on the additional green bins Council operatives have been instructed not to empty them.

Applications are invited by anyone registered as a Local Government Elector for the parish on the Electoral Register who has been living in the parish for the whole of the period of the last 12 months. Interested persons should contact the Parish Clerk or any Parish Councillor for further information as soon as possible. To be considered, applications must be made to the Parish Clerk by the 6th of October 2019.

Traffic issues

93 Speedwatch sessions have been conducted this year and 1,619 speeding vehicles have been reported to the police.

Damage to a fence which resulted in 14 bulls escaping from a field.

An aggravated burglary occurred at a residential property in Duxford on 3/9/19 in which the victims were assaulted and a car stolen.

For consideration:

7 Abbey Street

The planning application has been submitted with changes to the proposed extension from a flat to peaked roof. The Council was unanimously in support of this application.

6 Church Street

Cllr Cheney declared an interest for this item as he is the applicant and left the room while the application was discussed. The remaining Councillors were in support of the application which largely related to replacing extensions.

Wellcome Genome Campus, Hinxton

Ickleton Parish Council remains opposed to the application. A further response has been made on the Parish Council's behalf following updated and new material submitted by Wellcome to SCDC. It was noted that Uttlesford District Council have opposed the application. Cllr Pavelin wished to thank Cllr Sadler for all the time and effort that he puts in to the planning applications of behalf of the Parish Council. It is likely that the Wellcome Trust's planning application will go before south Cambridgeshire District Council's Planning Committee on 24th or 31st October.

Harlequin House, 43 Abbey Street

Discharge of conditions relating to the conversion of a barn to residential accommodation.

Application for change of use allowing a small pottery studio to be built. Approved.

Planning Appeals:

Land adjacent to The Glebe, Frogge Street appeal decision. Appeal against SCDC's refusal of an application to build two dwellings dismissed by the Planning Inspector.

36 Butchers Hill

Reduce leylandii hedges to 10ft at the request of a neighbour.

Updates on current applications:

Smithson Hill

The Inspector's recommendation regarding the appeal is expected November, but the final say will be by the Secretary of State.

Uttlesford Local Plan

The Parish Council has submitted further representations to the Inspectors.

Marshall Aerospace and Defence Group relocation

They are due to announce their preferred location shortly.

Correspondence

The Parish Council has received a letter from a parishioner notifying them of a dog attack near the recreation ground. The Council would like to remind all dog owners that dogs should be kept under proper control. It is against the law to let a dog be dangerously out of control in a public place. The law applies to all dogs. Your dog is considered dangerously out of control if it injures someone or makes someone worried that it might injure them. A court could also decide that your dog is dangerously out of control if it attacks someone's animal or the owner of an animal thinks they could be injured if they tried to stop your dog attacking their animal. You can get an unlimited fine or be sent to prison for up to 6 months (or both) if your dog is dangerously out of control. You may not be allowed to own a dog in the future and your dog may be destroyed. Please see www.gov.uk/control-dog-public for further information.

Halloween and Fireworks

The Parish Council would like to remind residents to ensure that Halloween and bonfire night are celebrated safely and that animals, children and the elderly are given extra consideration. If you intend to let off rockets, please think about where they might land and try to avoid them ending up on your neighbours' homes or in their gardens. The law says you must not set off or throw fireworks (including sparklers) in the street or other public places. You must not set off fireworks on bonfire night from 12 midnight until 7 am. Reflections from the Rectory 13th September 2019

Dear friends,

Thank you all so much for the love and support you have expressed to us over the last ten days. We have been overwhelmed with love and kindness, not to mention meals, flowers, chocolate and wine and baskets of vegetables grown in gardens and allotments. It feels as though we are floating on a sea of love and prayer.

It's hard to believe that the place where a few days earlier, eighty or more of us spent a lovely afternoon eating cake, drinking tea and chatting with neighbours and friends, could be a place of such extreme violation. We have always kept a policy of open house; I like to think we are hospitable people and part of living in the Rectory is about people coming and going and about the welcome they receive. The police have now alarmed the house all over; we have devices on windows and doors and GPS alarms and panic buttons all linked straight to the police station. There is something I dislike about this on the one hand, but see how necessary it is on the other. We need to feel safe in our home.

Our daughter has not yet been able to face coming home and is staying with friends, so we are living between two places. They are wonderful people and I am so grateful to them for their kindness and gift of security for her, but it is heart breaking to come home without her each evening. That we know the perpetrators are safely locked away is of some comfort, but still it has taken something precious away – something far more precious than the few bits of metal they managed to get into their pockets.

The police have been wonderful, but the very nature of crime detection is that everything has to be done so quickly and once the criminals are arrested that time frame becomes even tighter. I lost count of the hours of waiting in rooms in the police station and how many times I told the story over and over again.

There have been many moments over these days when I have felt immensely proud of my daughter. What she went through was unthinkable, but she was able to do all that was asked of her afterwards and make a significant contribution to tracing the two men. However, a couple of nights ago she said, "You know, in a way I feel quite sorry for them." She had recognised that not only must they have such awful lives, in and out of prison, always looking over their shoulder, living on the proceeds of the bits and pieces they manage to steal and having no concept whatsoever of the emotional damage they do. What kind of childhood must they have had? Utterly dysfunctional with none of the support and privilege that she and her friends have had. In that moment I felt so proud of her, because she was right. It doesn't excuse or negate what they have done to her, but it's the beginning of a transformation. It's where goodness and compassion and generosity break in like a chink of light in the darkness.

Our lives have been turned upside down and the future feels very uncertain at the moment. But we are blessed to be so surrounded by love and prayer and the knowledge that there is no darkness the love of God cannot make light. There is nothing that God's creative power cannot heal.

In the words of Julian of Norwich: *He did not say 'you shall not be tempest-tossed, you shall not be weary, you shall not be discomforted,' but he said, 'You shall not be overcome.' And all shall be well, and all shall be well. All manner of thing shall be well.*

I am on compassionate leave for the time being, so that I can focus on supporting my daughter and recovering from this ordeal.

Old Ickleton

Richard Hebert has been researching our village's history and has the following to tell, and found the pictures attached.....

'A recent sale at Cheffins in Cambridge listed a scrap album from the Mundy family of Caldrees Manor. It contained a few 19th century sketches in the village, the most intriguing (and sad) was a drawing entitled 'Funeral of the Miller's child'.

The Ickleton Society looked through our records, and found the burial of George Smith Mumford, son of William Mumford, miller of Ickleton, on 29th March 1848, aged 9 - 12 months.

From the tombstone records of the church, there is a quite weather worn one that reads "In Loving Memory of SARAH ANN The wife of William MUMFORD Miller of this Parish, Died September 4 1897? Also GEORGE SMITH MUMFORD, Son of the above, Age ????? months".

Looking at other BMD records it is clear that Sarah Ann's date of death was actually September 4th 1847, only a few months after her son George Smith Mumford's birth.

Thus when George Smith Mumford died in 1848, his name was added to her tombstone.

At the time of the sketch, William would have been mourning the death of both his wife and son. Is he the man on the left of the drawing? Or following behind the four female mourners?

He gave up the Ickleton mill in 1847 and moved to Hinxton. He died in 1894 aged 72, and was buried in the Ickleton cemetery on 29th June.'

Another drawing of Ickleton in the scrap album is dated 1855. It appears to have been sketched from the former gateway of Caldrees, just right of the current one, looking towards the junction of Frogge Street and Church Street.

Note the old cottage in the centre, either where 57 Church Street or the Gertrude Homes now are. IS has a summary of the deeds of the Gertrude Homes on the website (D306), which refers to a cottage on the site in 1780, and described in 1788 as a "cottage with a yard or garden fronting Frogge Street & an adjoining cottage".

See also the weathervane on the gable end of 1 Frogge Street.'
