**Ickleton Parish Council - Extracts from the Parish Council meeting minutes held on 20<sup>th</sup> August 2025.**

The Parish Council wishes to draw your attention to the following:

**Planning information from South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC)**

**SCDC planning decisions:**

**25/01926/FUL** Site: The Heath Rectory Farm Grange Road. Proposal: Installation of external wall cladding to existing agricultural barn. Status: Application Permitted.

**25/0642/TTCA** Site: Vine Cottage Butchers Hill. Proposal: Yew tree – Fell. Status: No Objection.  
To consider any comments to be returned to SCDC relating to tree works:

**25/0713/TTCA** Site address: 63 Abbey Street. Proposal: Walnut tree, T1 - since the tree was crown reduced in 2021, it has grown considerably and is approximately 17m high by 14m wide. Some branches extend over the adjacent public footpath and over the gardens of neighbours. It is proposed to reduce the crown to the points where it was pruned on previous occasions after which it will be approximately 14m high by 11m wide. Holly, T2 - it is proposed to trim the side shoots back by 0.5-1m to maintain the conical shape of the tree. Comment by 12<sup>th</sup> August 2025. This was circulated to Councillors prior to the meeting. No discussion at meeting as the deadline for comment has passed

### **Have Your Say on Local Housing Needs**

Ickleton Parish Council is asking for your support in completing the Housing Needs Survey recently delivered to all households.

The aim of this survey is to understand whether there is a shortage of affordable housing for local people in our community.

The anonymous survey, being conducted independently by Cambridgeshire ACRE, invites you to share your views on whether you support the principle of providing affordable homes in Ickleton for people with a strong connection to the parish. It also asks whether there is a housing need within your household or extended family.

We encourage all households to complete the survey, even if you do not currently have a housing need. A high response rate ensures that the views of the whole community are reflected and will provide clear evidence to guide future planning decisions.

If you know of family members who have moved away but would like to return to Ickleton, or of people working locally who live elsewhere, additional copies of the survey can be requested from Cambridgeshire ACRE.

Importantly, the survey is being carried out by Cambridgeshire ACRE, a registered charity experienced in rural housing, and funded by English Rural Housing Association, so there is no cost to the Parish. All responses are confidential – the Parish Council will not have access to any personal information.

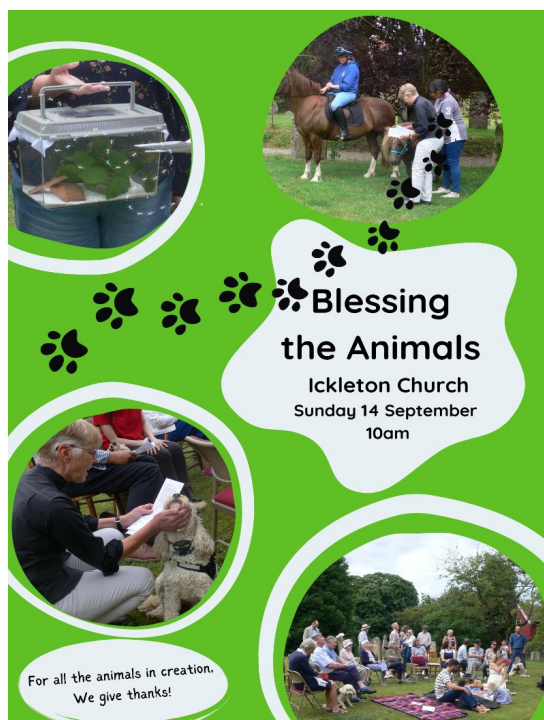

Got your owl? Your massive trunk? Your quidditch broomstick? You're ready for school... at least you are if you're off to Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry. From Malory Towers to Harry Potter, school stories have shaped our understanding of education. As a child, I loved them, especially when it involved a boarding school. Somehow, I was convinced that life would be far better if I were a boarder, although I was thinking about the more congenial establishments. Children's fiction is just as full of the places you would much rather not attend, like St Custard's, Geoffrey Willan and Ronald Searle's creation from *Down with skool*.

While we all wait for the new HBO Harry Potter series, it's time to take a few tips from the original films and their back to front back to school preparations. Remember the moment in *Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets*, where Dobby the House Elf and Uncle Vernon try to stop Harry from returning to Hogwarts? **Walk and picnic, Saturday 20 September, short and longer options available** – we're hoping the weather will be kind to us for a late summer walk. We have short and longer options – to suit everyone, including families but we'll all meet up en route.

**Long option** – we'll meet at the corner of Grange Road and Coploe Road at **10.30am**. We'll walk up the track the other side of the motorway and then across the fields to Rectory Farm where we'll meet up with the rest of the group before going on to the Grange. The distance to Rectory Farm is about 2 miles.

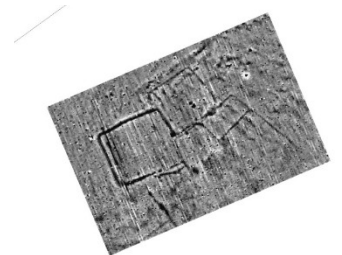
**Short option** – you can drive to Rectory Farm (up the track next to the pumpkin patch off Grange Road) and park. Meet there at **11.45am** and those doing the longer walk will hopefully get there at about the same time. We'll then all walk along the track that leads to the Grange where we can picnic. This is a distance of about ¾ mile. If we wish, we can walk up to the ridge to take in the views before we head back the way we came.

Everyone is welcome - this is open to members and non-members. While parts of the routes are on tracks, not all will be so there are places where it will be difficult for buggies, but otherwise is suitable for children. Dogs are also welcome on leads. Don't forget to bring a picnic!

We're very grateful to our farmers, Lewis Duke, Sian and Peter Wombwell and Charles Frankau for allowing us to walk their land.

**Stories from Brookhampton Cemetery, afternoon of Saturday 25 October** – Emma Easterbrook has kindly agreed to do a repeat of her first tour of the cemetery which some people were sorry to have missed last September. Her stories of people buried there and their family connections are fascinating. Full details will be sent to members in the next couple of weeks and remaining places advertised in next month's Icene.

**August archaeological dig** – the latest dig at Abbey Farm excavated what appeared, from the geophys (see photo), to be a sizeable, possibly Iron Age, enclosure. The team excavated sections across the ditches and finds include pottery from the early, middle and late Iron Ages. In East Anglia, those periods run from around 800BC to the arrival of the Romans in about 50AD. During this time people typically lived in small farming settlements of which this appears to be one. The pottery may tell us more about them and their way of life as it is examined in detail.

## Wetlands wildlife news

### Rose galls

The hot dry summer has been very good for insects and in particular wasps, as anyone who has tried to eat outside will have noticed. What you won't have noticed are the tiny parasitic wasps that feed on plants. The female wasps, which are only about 4mm long, lay their eggs in the buds of the plants, and somehow cause the buds to mutate and form galls. There is a theory that they do this by chemically altering the plants' DNA. The wasp grubs develop inside the galls, which both protect them and act as a food source. The wasps emerge in spring, nearly all as females, ready to repeat the cycle. Often the galls are just dull green or brown balls, like those found on oak trees, known as oak apples. Those found on the wild roses on the wildflower meadow on the wetlands, however, are rather more interesting, and very colourful. They have the lovely common name of robin's pincushion.

### Wetlands wildlife walk      Wednesday 17th September

September's wetlands wildlife walk will take place on Wednesday the 17th of September between 12:00 and 13:00. The walk will be led, as usual, by Iain Webb of the Wildlife Trust. We meet on the wooden bridge between the wetlands and main campus just before 12:00, and we will particularly be looking at, and listening to birds.

### Bat walk

**On the evening** of Wednesday the 17th of September there will be a bat walk on the Genome Campus and wetlands. We will meet at security for 18:45, where Iain will distribute bat detectors, which will allow us to hear the ultrasonic sounds the bats make. Iain will give a short talk about bats before we set off to find them. He will explain the sounds of echo location, communication and hunting.

### Vaccines Update

As we approach the colder months, there are a number of vaccines that can help protect you against serious illness, including:

**FLU** - this vaccine helps protect against flu, which can be a serious or life-threatening illness. It's offered on the NHS every year in autumn or early winter to people at higher risk of getting seriously ill from flu.

**COVID-19** - the Covid-19 vaccine helps protect against Covid-19, which can be a serious or life-threatening illness for some people. It's usually offered on the NHS in early winter to people who need extra protection from Covid-19.

**RSV** - the RSV vaccine helps protect against Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) that can make babies and older adults seriously ill. This is offered all year round.

**SHINGLES** - this vaccine helps protect against shingles and is offered all year round. Shingles is a common condition that causes a painful rash. It can sometimes lead to serious problems such as long-lasting pain, hearing loss or blindness. You're more likely to get shingles, and it is more likely to cause serious problems, as you get older or if you have a severely weakened immune system.

**PNEUMOCOCCAL (pneumonia)** - this vaccine is offered all year round. It helps protect against serious illnesses like pneumonia and meningitis.

***Book your flu vaccine with us and when you come in we can check what other vaccines you are eligible for.***
