**Some items discussed at the Parish Council meeting held on 20<sup>th</sup> June 2012:**

**Queen Elizabeth's Diamond Jubilee** – The Jubilee weekend was felt by all to have been most enjoyable and a great success. The fact that it was such a success despite the best efforts of the unseasonable bad weather was all down to some very hard work by all the volunteers and exceptional planning by the entire Jubilee Committee headed up by Katherine Denman-Johnson. A superb weekend was rounded off by the lighting of the beacon on Coploe Hill, which was such a memorable occasion for the many who attended from the village. The Parish Council wants to say to the whole village – **THANK YOU ALL SO VERY MUCH FOR THAT MARVELLOUS WEEKEND!**

**Vacancy – Parish Councillor: Co-option** – The Parish Council will fill the current vacancy by co-option at their meeting on 18<sup>th</sup> July 2012. One person has already expressed an interest in becoming a Parish Councillor. ## **JOHN EDWARD ALLEN MARSHALL**

**(17/08/26 - 23/05/12)**

John was born in Calcutta, the eldest of four sons of Ted and Madeleine Marshall. The family returned to Britain before the Second World War and John went to school at Charterhouse, in Surrey, where games sometimes took preference over study. From school he went straight into the army and served in the Rifle Brigade in Germany. He decided to leave the army in 1952 and worked from then on as a broker in various shipping firms, on the Baltic Exchange in the City of London. He met Judy in 1953 and they were married at St Andrew's Church in Much Hadham the next year. They started married life in a tiny mews house in London, where Susie was born in 1955. They moved to Newport, Saffron Walden in 1956 to Border Cottage, a small Georgian House, the scene of many a happy party and family gathering. Christopher was born there in 1957 and Tessa in 1959. After Tessa's death aged 8 they moved 200 yards down the road to Parsonage House, which became a focus for many splendid gatherings for all ages. Susie was married from there in 1981 and in the following year they moved to Larkhill House, Grange Road, Ickleton, a much loved home occupied also by a succession of labradors. After John had suffered recurrent bouts of ill health and several admissions to Addenbrooke's they decided a move to the centre of Ickleton was more sensible. This was a very happy decision and Priory Close became a real home to them, surrounded as it is by real friends and neighbours. John died there very peacefully gazing out at the garden, which he loved so much. John loved his stay in Ickleton, particularly his stint as church warden with Rosie Hayes for ten years. John had a great gift for friendship as was evidenced by the attendance at his funeral. He became a well known figure on the Rec, moving at a slow walk, with a large stick and the faithful Beetle at his heels.

### **An appreciation**

John had an enormous capacity for friendship and this was reflected in the size of the congregation at his funeral which was held on June 12<sup>th</sup> in our parish church, a place with which he was so familiar, having given unstinting support to its life, both spiritual and practical, over many years. The fact that the church fabric is in such good order is due in no small part to his continuing attention to its upkeep long after he retired as churchwarden. Indeed, to the very last, he supported all church activities, even learning a new skill – bellringing - so that he could take part in 'ringing in' the new century.

We served together as wardens for ten years and John had a clear vision to try, during our term, to make the church as inclusive as possible – which he achieved. With his warmth, humour, wisdom, courtesy and patience, he gradually persuaded more people to get involved in the day-to-day running of the church as well as in its outreach and worship.

In practical terms, we had a major challenge to meet when we took office, namely the repair of the church spire, and for two years John was involved in constant fundraising activities and face-to-face meetings with parishioners to ask for their financial support. He never flagged and, eventually, in 1992, the money was raised and the spire repaired. We climbed it together to 'top it out' which involved pouring some Champagne over the newly gilded weathervane and drinking the rest ourselves!

John's life touched so many people and we, in the church community, will remember him with particular fondness; he will be hugely missed and I shall never be able to look up at our magnificent church spire without thinking of him. I was privileged to work with him.

# **SAWSTON MEDICAL PRACTICE**

## ***A few facts and figures about the practice***

Currently we have around 13800 patients registered with our practice. In April this year we provided 6713 appointments which equates to almost 49% of our patients consulting with a clinician (either face-to-face or on the telephone) in just one month, which is a huge achievement. The national average is to provide 70 appointments per week per 1000 patients, which on a monthly basis would mean that we would be offering around 4300 appointments per month. Our figures show that we offer well in excess of this amount. Looking at these figures it is really important that if you have an appointment that you no longer need please let us know so that we can allocate it to someone else.

We look at our services very carefully and are constantly striving to ensure we provide the best possible service for all our patients. The amount of time that you wait to be seen when you arrive for a booked appointment is an issue that we are trying to improve. On average, patients with booked appointments wait for approximately 7 minutes to see a clinician. This is an area we would like to improve and you could help us by being prepared for your appointment. For instance, if you are attending for a vaccination please ensure that you wear clothing that can easily be rolled up or removed. Equally if you have a specific issue you wish to raise please make a note of it so that you can discuss it with the doctor or nurse. If you have several issues it may not be possible to deal with them all in one 10-minute appointment so you will need to think about which are the most urgent and important for the appointment.

## ***Health Passport***

This is something that we are hoping to introduce in the near future. It will be a patient-held record of known health issues, current measurements of Blood Pressure, Cholesterol, BMI (body mass index) and relevant blood results. Included also will be lifestyle advice and ways in which we can work with you to improve your health. We feel that working together with our patients, agreeing actions to be taken and monitoring at specific intervals will give you a better outcome.

## ***Fundraising***

As you may know the practice has been taking part in the Olympic themed "Gold Challenge". We have covered over 2000 km by cycling, running, rowing, walking etc. Our recent practice boundary bike ride of just over 30 miles raised around £600 for Arthur Rank Hospice. A huge thank you to everyone who sponsored the riders, or who had collection tins in their pub or shop, all donations were very gratefully received. One very kind lady also held a garden party to help us and raised just over £200 for us – thank you Anne, that was brilliant. In total we have raised about £1600, leaving us around £400 of our target still to find. If you can help us raise this last amount we would be extremely grateful. ## **THE CHESTERFORDS, ICKLETON AND HINXTON W.I.**

Mr. Sanders from Littlebury was the guest speaker at the June meeting. As a boy he was evacuated from London with his mother and sister to a house in Bridge End, Saffron Walden.
