Extracts from the Parish Council Meeting held on 15 October 2014

SCDC Thermal Imaging Camera available for home energy surveying The Parish Council is putting in a bid to SCDC for the loan of the above camera this year. If any resident is interested in using this camera to find out where their house is losing heat, please contact the Clerk by 14th November 2014.

Street Lights Many households in the village will have received a leaflet from Balfour Beatty and CCC explaining that work is to start on upgrading and replacing (in some cases removing) street lights owned by the County Council. Further information available from the website www.lightingcambridgeshire.com suggests that the process will start here in November. We are seeking more information as we understand that plans are quite far advanced, and we will pass on whatever we find out as soon as we find it out.

World War I Commemoration – Trees Sian Wombwell reported that she and Lewis Duke had been to meet up with Arabella Killander of Pampisford Hall who has her own Arboretum. The visit proved to be very helpful and informative. She recommended for the centenary trees – Beech or Oak (columnar form) of a European variety as these fared better than the British tree. The costings were not yet known for the purchase of 16 trees.

The Councillors said they preferred them to be the same tree and an Oak was favoured. Mrs Killander was happy to contact her tree supplier, as it was recommended that smaller trees should be planted. Lewis Duke had volunteered to prepare the ground and maybe place helium balloons at each spot where the trees would be planted. Sian Wombwell said each tree would need a mulch mat and a guard. It was agreed to purchase the trees and **a planting ceremony for the first tree should take place on Tuesday 11 November 2014** after a two minutes silence at 11.00 am. The site is in the hedgerow on the left hand side of the summit **at the highest point of Coploe Road** – just by the field where the Millennium bonfire was held. All are welcome to attend.

20 mph Speed Limit project The Parish Council submitted a bid for funding to support the introduction of a 20 mph speed limit for the majority of the village streets in September. In support of the bid the Chairman will make a presentation to a panel of County Councillors on 30th October 2014. Councillor Peter Topping will also attend the presentation.

Traffic calming installations The Parish Council is continuing to press for the outstanding white lining to be completed on the Duxford Road feature. We are also consulting with CCC Highways on the possibilities of increasing the visibility of the Frogge Street feature.

Daffodil bulbs Bulbs have been purchased and planted on the two green triangles at the top of Abbey Street.

Planning application(s) received from SCDC Mr Duke declared an interest and left the meeting. S/2090/14/FL – Alteration to window in west elevation to include provision of a door following removal of the existing lean-to element – Methodist Chapel, Abbey Street – Mr Lewis Duke. The plans had not been returned by the Planning Committee to be available at the meeting. The Chairman reported on the application. The Recommendation of Ickleton Parish Council was: Approve. Lewis Duke re-joined the meeting.

Appeal Decision (Ref: APP/W0530/A/14/2220481) – Planning Application ref: S/2207/13/FL – Use of Land for Mobile Home – Ickleton Riverside Barns, Frogge Street – Mr H Miles – Appeal is dismissed.

Tree Works subject to a Tree Preservation order or situated within a Conservation Area
Removal of trees at 28 Church Street – no application received. The Chairman had e-mailed SCDC (Ian Lorman) reporting the removal of 3 trees from the garden of the house (which is in the Conservation Area) which was currently up for sale. No response had yet been received. Cllr Martin agreed to speak to Charles Swain, who is the Head of Enforcement.

Play Area Councillors were glad to see that children were enjoying the new equipment in the Play Area. The new kit and the accompanying safety matting was funded by £6,000 worth of contributions under Section 106 from new developments in the village and an equal amount from the Parish Council's own funds. A new brown Heavy Duty Picnic table made from recycled plastics is being ordered and should be in place shortly.

Running Track Thanks to the sterling initiative of Jess Bloomfield and with the support of the Parish Council a 400m running track has been marked out around the football fields for all to make use of.

Wellcome Trust The annual Firework Display will take place on Thursday 6th November 2014. All villagers are welcome to attend this non-ticketed event. (See page 9 for details of the event and instructions regarding parking and access, etc.).

SCDC and Flooding – availability of sandbags

In the event of flooding - depending upon the scale of flooding around the South Cambridgeshire district, Council resources may be seriously stretched and supplies of sand bags may be limited and slow delivery timescales could be experienced. In an emergency situation, this service can be accessed from 08.00 hrs to 17.30 hrs (Monday to Friday) by telephoning: 03450 450 063. Outside these hours, calls should be made to the Environmental Health Duty Officer via their pager service on 01253 501055.

Residents should take action to protect their own properties as much as possible, especially if you live in an area that has had issues in the past. Sandbags can be obtained from either of two sources:

STREET LIGHTING CHANGES – happening in November!

Presentation and meeting on Monday 3rd November 6.30 – 8 pm in the Village Hall

Residents will have received leaflets and a letter about changes to street lighting. Street lights owned by the County Council are being replaced. A handful of street lights will be removed altogether. Balfour Beatty is carrying out the work for the County Council.

Detailed plans have been obtained by Parish Councillors, who are reviewing them. The plans can be found online at www.lightingcambridgeshire.com. If you search for Ickleton on the New Lighting Page the plans for our streets will come up. The plans have also been posted on the Village Website www.ickletonvillage.co.uk and you will find them on the Home Page or under Announcements. There is also a copy of an Information Pack for Councillors that helps with understanding the plans.

I have to stress that the Parish Council has had very little advance notice of the plans, and we will have very little influence on the work to be carried out. We cannot influence the design or height of the new lighting columns. They will all have a bright white light. We may not be able to have much say where columns are being relocated. If we object to the removal of a column, we have to say where another column must be lost, as we have to accept the loss of a designated number of columns.

The new white light will have a brighter appearance than the present yellow light, but the new lamps are designed to shed light downwards and there should be less sideways and backwards spillage. We understand that a shield may be fitted if a resident can demonstrate a particular problem with light levels affecting his or her property.

We have arranged for a public meeting to be held in the Village Hall Meeting Room from 6.30 pm to 8.00 pm on Monday 3rd November. A Balfour Beatty representative will be there to explain the proposed changes and respond to your queries and concerns. There will be full-size copies of the plans and other explanatory material. All residents are welcome to attend.

The fate of each of the County Council's light columns has been spray painted at or near the base of each one. In most cases, look for a cross in a white circle, which indicates the new location of a replacement column. Columns to be removed altogether should have a notice attached saying so. If there is no spray paint or notice, the column belongs to the Parish Council and will not be involved in the programme – it will stay with the yellow light as now.

Streets affected by the programme are: Abbey Street (also losing a column), Duxford Road, Frogge Street, Priory Close, Southfield (also losing two columns), Coploe Road (the plan includes The Stackyard and Coploe Rise, each of which is losing a lighting column). Other streets in Ickleton are not affected.

I emphasise that the work based on these plans will be completed very quickly. Cambridgeshire County Council has approved the plans, and we have very little time in which to raise concerns. If you have any concerns, you should try and come to the meeting on 3rd November or let a Parish Councillor know what your concerns are.

News from the Rectory

This is the month for memory: for remembering who we have become by looking back at the people, and the events, which have shaped our present. This centenary year for the outbreak of the First World War is the largest of those contexts, and on Remembrance Sunday (the 9th November this year) the world-changing events of 1914 will be peculiarly present. But personal memories are bound up in that larger remembrance, even though direct recollection of the Great War has mostly passed from living memory.

It is because of that war that our nation changed the way it remembered the dead. The losses, and the sheer number of those missing, caused the Church at the time to think again about the forms of people's prayerful remembrance and how they might include those who had died in the community of the living in some way. It had been considered wrong to talk about 'praying for' anyone who had died, as if any human petition could make any difference; but in the face of such overwhelming and widespread loss (and given that the fate of many men was simply not known) the rigid boundaries erected between the dead and the living were relaxed, and from 1915 - following debates in Parliament which, believe it or not, got very heated on the subject - prayers began to be offered in churches for the missing faces in every community.

And whatever your position might be on faith, or on what even the faithful might think prayer itself is for, the naming of those men (and some women) offered them an honoured place among the living – a space at the table, if you like – which gave back to those mourning them some public space for both grief and celebration. And today we remember not only those who died in war, but all those we love and see no longer, most especially at this time of year. Our churches will hold a service in which we will name and honour our dead on 2nd November, in Hinxton Church at 6.30 pm, and we will honour the dead of our World Wars on 9th November at the War Memorial and at the Church. The dead are our community too, and a part of us.
