1. Spring has arrived (at least according to the South Cambs calendar) and we are now back to fortnightly collections of our green bins. Please note however that **from 1 April 2019** SCDC will be introducing a charge of £20 each from then until 30 September 2019 for any second and subsequent green bins per household. This charge will change to £35 per bin annually from 1 October 2019.

2. The winter schedule remains in operation at the Thriplow recycling centre until 31st March so the closing time during March remains at 4pm with the gates closing 10 minutes beforehand.

Ickleton Parish Council

Extracts from the Parish Council Meeting held on 20th February 2019

The Parish Council wish to draw your attention to the following:

1. Uttlesford District Council (UDC) Local Plan and the proposed "Garden Community" near Great Chesterford.

The consultation period on UDC's revised Sustainability Appraisal for its Local Plan ended on 25th February. Ickleton, together with neighbouring Villages, has submitted a strong response continuing its opposition to UDC's Local Plan. The Plan itself has now been submitted to the Planning Inspectorate which will carry out a public enquiry.

2. Wellcome Genome Campus Expansion Plans

Thank you to all residents who submitted comments on the Wellcome Trust's proposals to South Cambs District Council. The vast majority of responses from local residents and communities are opposing the proposals.

3. Plans for an AgriTech Park off the A1301 opposite Hinxton. There is nothing new to report this month.

4. Local Highways Improvement Funding 2019-2020

We should be informed in mid-March of the outcome of our funding bid to enable us to introduce a traffic calming measure on Frogge Street.

5. Other traffic news. The Speedwatch Team has had problems with their equipment and sessions were suspended until Cambridgeshire Police were able to provide replacement kit on indefinite loan. Meanwhile we are still collecting and analysing data on Frogge Street traffic via the vehicle-activated speed camera. As another traffic calming measure and, in an attempt to protect the grass verges around the Village, the Parish Council has agreed to purchase a number of flexible black and white posts which will be positioned where the need seems to be greatest.

6. Planning information received from SCDC

i. For consideration

S/0409/19/FL Crossways, Grange Road, Ickleton. Change of use from residential annex to dwelling. **Agreed** to support this application

S/0053/19/DC The Glebe, Frogge Street Discharge of conditions 3 (materials) and 4 (finish to access drive.) of S/0833/16/FL. **Noted**

ii. Approval of an application S/3801/18/FL 6 Church Street Demolition of existing rear extension and construction of new rear extension, side garage and new vehicular entrance **Noted**

iii. Refusal of an application S/4831/18/LB & S/3835/18/FL Demolition of a flint barn at 58 Abbey Street **Noted**

iv. Referral to us by Duxford Parish Council for consideration and possible response:

S/0350/19/FL Land south of the A505 and west of SMT Great Britain, Duxford

Proposed erection of two car dealerships/showrooms for occupation by Lancaster Porsche and Aston Martin incorporating i) the sale of new and used cars plus parts storage and sales; ii) new access from A505 including a protected right-hand turn lane into site when approaching from the west; iii) totem signs; iv) servicing and MOT areas; v) washing and car preparation valet areas. vi) display, staff and customer car parking; vii) new internal circulation roads, cycle paths and footpaths; and viii) hard and soft landscaping including provision of a 1.5m high mound on the western site boundary. (M Newton for Jardine Motors).

It was **agreed** to submit an objection to this application.

v. Consultation amendment. S/4129/18/FL Abbey Barns, Duxford Road. Erection of new building for office/research and development uses (Class B1). Proposed amendments relate to a revised design (Abbey 2000). **Agreed** by a majority to support the amended application

vi. Potential Development to the rear of properties on Brookhampton Street and Mill Lane. A developer appears to be exploring the potential of a large plot for development and is looking at access points. As a planning application has not been submitted, the Council **agreed** that no comments could be made at this stage.

7. Recreation Field (Play Area) The Parish Council is pleased to report that the general making-good and securing of the Play Area has been done. This involved clearing the overgrown area behind the Sports Store, levelling the ground and reseeding it, and it is now part of an enlarged Play Area.

8. Dogs off the lead on the Recreation Field

As reported in last month's Icene, the Parish Council has received complaints about dog fouling on the Recreation Field and also a report of one person having been bitten by a dog. This item caused considerable consternation on the part of dog owners who use the Recreation Field, especially those who take part in the daily afternoon gatherings which do a lot to socialise the dogs taking part. A number of residents wrote to point out that they "police" the Rec. during their afternoon walks, clearing up after their own and other dogs. Concerned dog owners also attended the Parish Council meeting to make their case. It is agreed by all that dog owners must be responsible for their dogs. Dogs should not

run freely if there is any doubt at all about them getting out of control. So **please** keep a watch on your dog at all times, both to protect everyone using the Rec and to keep it in a clean state. Following the representations received, the Parish Council has agreed for the time being not to insist on dogs being

on a lead at all times on the Recreation Field. It remains the responsibility of dog owners to ensure that we do not have to reconsider this decision.

9. Parish Council's Precept 2019/2020. This is the amount included in Council Tax to fund the Parish Council. For the coming year this increases by £500 to £25,000. This is a rise of 1.02% for a Band D property.

10. East West Rail Route Options Consultation.

There is an on-line consultation about route options for a railway to link Bedford and Cambridge at <https://eastwestrail.co.uk/haveyoursay>. The consultation ends on 11th March. Some of the route options include a new station at Bassingbourn. What East West Rail do not tell you is that the Bassingbourn option could result in up to 30,000 new homes being built in that area. You may think that the infrastructure there may not be able to cope! A pressure group CamBedRailRoad thinks another route altogether is to be preferred as it links up the existing and planned developments to the north and west of Cambridge. Their website has information about this <http://www.cambedrailroad.org/> and there is also advice on how to respond to the East West Rail consultation.

11. Parish Council Vacancy. Following the resignation of Owen McGuire, there is a vacancy on the Parish Council. We are required to display a formal notice on the Notice Board to give residents an opportunity to request a by election within the time limit on the notice. If a by election is not requested, the Parish Councillors will fill the vacancy by co-option. One resident has already expressed an interest in joining the Parish Council, but if anyone else wishes to put herself or himself forward please contact me.

Reflections from the Rectory

As I write I'm sitting beside the Dead Sea with a large box of the squidgiest dates and five fellow pilgrims to the Holy Land. The sun is beating down and we are in the dappled shade of a couple of date palm trees. Lest you should think the parish priest is shirking her duties, this is a Diocesan pilgrimage, there are 59 of us and the schedule has been extremely hectic; days lasting from 6.00 am often into the evening. The Biblical landscape is serene and beautiful in parts, but edgy, wild and infinitely strange in others. If the land itself is not quite the pastoral idyll of children's Bibles, nor is the place one of peace and tranquillity. This is a place characterised by a brutal wall separating neighbours that both have a legitimate claim to the land, but cannot live peaceably together.

From the post-lunch tranquillity of a fishing boat in the middle of Lake Galilee, still as glass and warm sun bathing us, we looked out towards the Galilean hills, Tiberias on one side and on another the distant mountains of Jordan and in yet another direction, the Golan Heights, a place of unimaginably brutal destruction and division. We came up against these disturbing juxtapositions time and time again. Who could forget the children in the St Vincent's orphanages, denied a surname/family name, because their fathers were the brothers or cousins who raped their mothers. these young women cannot let their pregnancy be discovered or they may be killed – by members of their own family. The orphanage is in, of all places, Bethlehem, where two thousand years ago another single mother gave birth in a strange town in a room or stable owned by strangers.

Then there were the two fathers, one a Jew and the other a Palestinian Muslim united in their grief for their daughters, one blown up by a suicide bomber and the other killed by a sniper. These two men spend all their time going from place to place, school to school trying to educate, especially children, hoping, praying that the younger generations might bring an end to the divisions that exist.

At the same time we met at the Pools of Bethesda where Jesus healed the paralytic man and where our own time of prayer brought healing in many different ways to the members of our group. We shared Communion on the shores of Galilee and in the Cathedral at Jerusalem. We joined the local community in Nazareth for their Sunday morning service, held simultaneously in English and Arabic!

Religious identity in this place is tied closely and visibly with cultural and ethnic identity and you soon learn, as one Palestinian Christian priest said, "There is a lot of religion in my country, but only a little faith." There is a difference. Religious identity is a good thing which gives a sense of belonging to a particular community, but without real faith it lacks the compassion and confidence that are rooted in the knowledge that we are all held in the love of the one creator God who sees us all alike – and in whose image we are *all* made. If that identity is focussed on the external trappings, which say that someone else is different and therefore a threat, it is dangerous.

True faith should give us a confidence to see the common humanity in every person, to reach out to others regardless of colour, ethnicity, religious identity, gender, sexual orientation, age or status. As the Jewish father said to us, "We should be building bridges, not walls."

Peace Roses

When the weather turned mild it was finally possible to plant the roses on the Green. Many thanks to Charles Frankau and Dominic Pallet for digging out the bed, to Catherine Cocks for overseeing the planting, to Clare Driver for supplying the roses and Ann Marie Hoare for planting them in memory of Marley. The Parish Council has installed a plaque showing that the roses commemorate the centenary of the end of the First World War. There is also a commemorative stone to Marley from the Driver and Hoare families.

Development Pressures

Thank you to everyone who wrote in to South Cambridgeshire District Council about the planning application for expansion of the Wellcome Trust Campus. We now have to wait and see what happens.

A planning application has recently been made by the company which runs the Lancaster Porsche and Aston Martin showrooms and service garage at Harston, to move to the A505 adjacent to Volvo and double its current size. It will be very visible, have security lighting for part of the hours of darkness, and security fencing. The company argues that this is the only possible site they have been able to find. You can find the application on the S Cambs Planning webpages by searching on Duxford parish or under the reference S/0350/19*. The Society has objected to the application. In our view anything which adds to the traffic problems and ribbon development on the A505 should be resisted. This is another development which has not gone through the Local Plan process, it is a green field site and the showrooms would have an adverse impact on the landscape which at that stretch of the road is currently open fields. Our letter and full arguments are on the application page on S Cambs website. If you agree with us, please respond as soon as possible to the consultation if you can. The deadline is 28 February but is usually open for a while longer.

Date for Your Diary – our very short **AGM will be on Wednesday 8 May at 7.30pm** and, as usual, will be followed by a talk. This year we have Hilary Ritchie, the archivist from Addenbrooke's Hospital, who will talk about the history and development of the hospital. More details next month.
