Please Note:

1. Commencing 1 April SCDC have introduced a charge of £20 each from then until 30 September 2019 for any second and subsequent green bins per household. This charge changes to £35 per bin annually on 1 October 2019. Unless the correct authorisation is displayed on the additional green bins Council operatives have been instructed not to empty them.

2. The summer schedule is now in place at the Thriplow recycling centre so the closing time is 5pm, with the gates closing 10 minutes beforehand.

Extracts from the Parish Council meeting held on 17th April 2019

The Parish Council wishes to draw your attention to the following:

1. Uttlesford Local Plan and the proposed "Garden Community" near Great Chesterford. All local Parish Councils have made strong representations in opposition to this proposed development and we now wait to see whether these have had any effect.

2. Wellcome Genome Campus Expansion Plans. A meeting was scheduled in April between Members of South Cambs Planning Committee and representatives of the Wellcome Trust to discuss the Application relating to the Genome Campus. Other parties such as Parish Councils and members of the public were not invited. However following representations this meeting was cancelled, to be

replaced by a meeting open to the public at which other interested parties may speak. No date has been announced as yet. Parish Councillors from local Parishes will be meeting shortly with the Project Director who has offered them an update.

Meanwhile, a date for your diary: The EBI (European Bioinformatics Institute) which is located on the Wellcome Genome Campus is celebrating its 25th anniversary at an event on 7th September, to which local residents will be invited. It should be a lively family event with fairground rides, food, drink and music. More details later.

3. Plans for an AgriTech Park off the A1301 opposite Hinxton. Cllr McDonald has informed us that the hearing of the appeal against SCDC Planning Committee's rejection of SmithsonHill's planning application will be held over twelve days in June and July.

4. Local Highways Improvement Funding 2019-2020. We have received an initial design from County Highways of a priority build out on Frogge Street, for which we were awarded funding recently. The location however differed somewhat from what had previously been agreed with County Highways, so we have had to get back to them. These things are sent to try us!

5. Planning information received from SCDC

1. Planning applications received:

i) (a) **S/0985/19/LB** Conversion of uninhabited existing barn into three bedroom dwelling over three storeys. Harlequin House, 43 Abbey Street

i) (b) Variation of condition 1 (approved plans) & 11 (no windows or doors at the side or rear elevations of barn conversion) of planning permission S/4447/17/VC & S/0946/19/VC. The Parish Council decided to maintain its objections to (a) to be consistent with its concerns regarding vehicular access from Back Lane. The variation (b) of approved plans was objected to owing to the proposal to have a Juliet balcony, which seemed incongruous in a barn conversion. It was **agreed to draw these concerns to SCDC Planning officers' attention.**

ii) **UTT/19/0573/OP:** Outline application with all matters reserved except for access for the development of up to 76 dwellings, including provision of vehicular and pedestrian access, public open space and hard and soft landscaping on land to the south west of London Road, Little Chesterford (Mr J Knight Axis Land Partnerships). Although this application fell within the jurisdiction of Uttlesford District Council, the plan to build 76 houses on land adjacent to Ash Green – in effect an extension of Great Chesterford - could well add to traffic congestion in Ickleton. It was agreed therefore to support both Little and Great Chesterford's objections to this speculative proposal.

2. Planning applications approved

S/0713/19/FL Installation of two flues at the Bridget Ogilvie Building, Wellcome Genome Campus, Hinxton.

3. Tree Application Conservation Area.

S/1065/19/TC 33 Abbey Street

Reduce cherry tree by 1-5M all round; reduce height of plum tree by 2M and laterals by 1M and thin remaining crown by 15%, reduce regrowth of crab apple by 0.5 M. Also prune a magnolia by no more than 1M.

It was agreed to make no comment

4. Further planning proposals on the horizon

i. **Huawei** As published in local papers, it is now general knowledge that Huawei has purchased the old Spicers site on the Sawston by-pass for around £37m and it is envisaged that 400 jobs will be created in the first phase of new development. Public exhibitions were held in Sawston at short notice at the end of April. We understand that the proposals will be on www.theformerspicerssite.co.uk from 29 April. A planning application is intended by the end of May.

ii. **Cambridge Metro plans** You may well have seen information about this on the TV or in local papers. Our District Councillor, Peter McDonald, has pointed out the phenomenal costs of the proposed scheme (£4 billion). If it does go ahead, there may be implications for some villages to the south of Cambridge, but these will be dependent on the route chosen for the East-West Rail Link. We can only watch and wait, and look out for any opportunity to comment.

6. Annual Parish Meeting on 22 May. To be held in the Gordon Woolhouse Room in the Village Hall. Doors open at 7pm for drinks and refreshments with the meeting proper starting at **7.30pm.**

This is not a Parish Council meeting, but the Annual Parish meeting to which all residents are invited to hear from the Parish Council and other Ickleton organisations about what has been going on over the

last year. All will be welcome. You have the chance to be updated on the issues Councillors are most concerned about (usually traffic and development threats) and to put your own concerns to them. As you can see from the above, there is no shortage of contentious issues for discussion.

Reflections from the Rectory

Easter has happened. We will have celebrated the resurrection, eaten too much chocolate and returned to school/work/normality just a day or two later and are now probably counting the shopping days to Christmas. In the church, we are, quite literally counting the days (40, since you ask) to Ascension and then Pentecost.

But when did the resurrection happen? If we read the gospel accounts, those who went down to the garden found the stone sealing the entrance of the tomb had already been rolled back and it was empty. Jesus' body had gone, but one actually witnessed the moment. Mary Magdalene was so distraught by the empty tomb, she mistook the risen Christ for the gardener and it was only when he spoke her name that she recognised him and was restored to herself. The loss and grief that had disorientated her and held her in the darkness and sorrow of Good Friday was shattered in a word, "Mary."

For the disciples on the road to Emmaus it was after journeying with Jesus, listening to him speak, inviting him to share a meal with them, that they recognised him as he broke bread and for others it was when he came into the room and spoke to them. For Thomas, sceptical, doubting, who would not believe unless he could see and touch for himself, it was that invitation to touch Christ's wounds.

There are many things in life that cause us to hold on to 'Good Friday'. Grief and loss can cause us to feel disorientated, incomplete, diminished. Broken relationships, illness – our own or that of someone we love, loss of a job, too much work or work that overwhelms; the list is endless and each situation is unique. Each of us needs to find a way and give ourselves the time to work out who we are in this changed situation, to reorient ourselves and move onwards still bearing the scars, but with wounds perhaps beginning to heal a little.

The different accounts of the different people who encountered the risen Christ at different times and in different places tell us that it happens differently for each of us. We are all individuals and he meets us where we are just as we are, whether we are the doubters, the disorientated, the confused, if we are the ones who betray, mock, deny or despair, if we are grief-stricken or just lost. We are the people who make up the church, all of us frail and imperfect, but hopeful, and trying to be better; more loving, more compassionate as we celebrate the new life that is possible when we encounter the risen Christ. It's not too late to say Happy Easter!

Did You Know? John Ripsher, the first President of Tottenham Hotspur Football Club was baptised in Ickleton!

John's father, Henry Ripsher, came from Ickleton. In 1836 he married Jane Loader at St Martin in the Fields and the family lived in London. John was born there in 1840 but was baptised at St Mary Magdalene Church. He was a bible class teacher at All Hallows Church, Tottenham and provided accommodation, guidance and support to the boys who created Tottenham Hotspur. John was the first Treasurer, first President of the Club from 1883 to 1894 and later a patron. He was described in a 1908 history book as the "real father and founder" of the Club. He went to live with his sister in Dover in 1894. He had heart problems and, sadly, became blind. He died in poverty in the local workhouse in 1907 and was buried in an unmarked pauper's grave. 100 years later his grave was tracked down and a headstone was erected, paid for by the Tottenham Tribute Trust. The dedication ceremony was attended by members of the Ripsher family, Club officials and supporters. It was hosted by the Mayor of Dover and followed by a civic reception. (With thanks to Jan Cafferkey, a descendent of the Ripsher family.)
