Extracts from the Parish Council meeting held on 21st August 2019

The Parish Council wishes to draw your attention to the following:

Notice of Parish Councillor vacancy

A casual vacancy exists on the Parish Council. Notice has been given pursuant to Section 87(2) of the Local Government Act 1972. On receipt of a request in writing from any ten Ickleton electors, an

election to fill the vacancy will be held. If no such request is made by 30th August 2019 the vacancy will be filled by co-option by the Parish Council. Interested persons should contact the Clerk or any Parish Councillor for further information as soon as possible.

Tribute to Hinxton Parish Council Chair Willy Brown

Following the sad death of Willi Brown, Chairman Sian Wombwell paid tribute to him, stating that he was a well-regarded man and will be missed by Ickleton Parish Council. He was a towering intellect, Master of Darwin College and awarded a CBE for his work at ACAS. He was brilliant at opposing the various aggressive, planning applications faced by our local villages. Cllr Wombwell will attend a memorial service on behalf of Ickleton Parish Council.

Cllr Terry Sadler also paid tribute stating that Willy Brown was instrumental in bringing local Parish Councils together and that Ickleton PC must continue to work closely with neighbouring Councils.

Traffic issues

CCC Highways - policy regarding fixed vehicle activated speed display signs:

Highways have stated that fixed vehicle activated speed signs cannot be put up in Ickleton village as their policy is to approve the use of mobile vehicle activated speed signs only. Therefore, in order for fixed signs to be considered there would need to be a change in policy. The Speedwatch Team will write to Cllr Topping requesting his support in lobbying for a change in policy and have asked that the Parish Council also support this. It was resolved that the Council will support this action.

Speedwatch update:

12 Speedwatch sessions in the last month. 1401 speeding vehicles have been reported to the police in 82 sessions so far this year, which is an increase on the previous year.

Rural Crime Report

The fly tipping on Frogge Street has been reported several times to South Cambs District Council (SCDC) by the Parish Council, but remains in situ despite the current fly tipping campaign by SCDC. Fly tipping is illegal and can be reported to the police if it is witnessed by dialling 999 or online via the SCDC website – see notice on page 11.

Reflections from the Rectory

An article was published recently in a national newspaper about research in Denmark on the value of culture for mental health and well-being. Participants with significant mental health problems such as anxiety, depression or stress, at levels which prevented them functioning properly, so affecting sleep and eating patterns, their ability to work, relationships, etc., were exposed to cultural activities three or more times a week. This might mean singing in a group, going to a concert, an art gallery or museum, taking part in an art or craft workshop, in order to increase their resilience. In one instance *participants were encouraged to snuggle up under blankets in a dimly lit room in an Aalberg library while a librarian read to them for two hours.*

Most of us will not have been read to since childhood and so, for some of the participants, this was an emotional experience. Being read to signifies that the reader is attentively giving us time. Story-telling is an inherent part of what it is to be a human being. Even before stories were written down, people would sit, gazing into the firelight and listen to stories, hanging on to every word of the story-teller.

Stories are how we make sense of the world; the interplay between those things we know through experience and those things beyond our own experience or imaginings. We get lost, taken up into stories, so we don't just hear them on a cerebral level, we *experience* them, get caught up in them, identify with the characters or are infuriated with them. We become involved, so our emotions and our own life, experience and memory come into play.

Stories are where we seek out the familiar; those things we can identify with, but which lead to the unfamiliar, the un-experienced. We can understand the behaviour of a heroine, even if we've never been in that situation, because we can imagine. When my son died, thirteen years ago, I reached desperately for Vera Britten's *Testament of Youth* and Margaret Spufford's *Celebration* in an attempt to *connect* with someone who had experienced and survived the same level of grief, albeit in markedly

different circumstances from my own. Here was common ground, a shared journey through a different grief, but oddly comforting. I wasn't alone.

There is, of course, one place where you can be read to on a regular basis - in church. Each day extracts from the Bible are read aloud, as we work through the different books chapter by chapter. It's easy to dismiss the Bible as a book written thousands of years ago with nothing to say to us today and to dismiss those who wrote it as unsophisticated, yet, read, perhaps with guidance, with time, over and over again, here we find there is nothing new under the sun and here is some of the most sophisticated thinking. Human beings are the same. The same emotions are felt, the same mistakes are made. Power and wealth still corrupt; there are always the rich and powerful and the poor and powerless.

It is frustrating to realise that, despite access to this rich wisdom, we have learned nothing; that we still have the propensity to mess things up big time and yet, it is oddly comforting too, to know that others have been here before, have ploughed the same furrows before us, have failed, succeeded, loved and lost, learned and forgotten, lived and died. This is the story in which we can find our *story*; where we can seek out our beginnings, our origins. It's a story that doesn't just take us on a linear journey through time, but a journey deep into our selves, where we can take comfort in the familiar aspects of the stories of others and learn from them. It's a lifelong journey of visiting and revisiting even the familiar, so the words can reveal to us the many layers beneath the narrative.

Being in church is one of the few places where adults can experience being read to on a regular basis and I'd like to think it does contribute to our well-being. So, if you're too shy to take your duvet down to the library, do come and join us in church on a Sunday (or weekday) morning. The times are given above in the service schedule. You'd be most welcome (and you can bring your duvet!)

ICKLETON SOCIETY

From Flames to Frescoes – the exhibition in St Mary Magdalene Church, Ickleton, August Bank Holiday weekend

At the time of writing, the first day of the exhibition has just finished. Things got off to a fairly steady start in the morning and then a splendid crowd came along in the afternoon to hear the talks about the fire and the wall paintings. Hilary Rule brought the events to life by telling us how she and Derek were the first to discover the fire; how she called 999 while Derek went back to the Church; and how the police drove off to Cemetery Corner where they had noticed a man parked up and watching the flames who they discovered had hand bells from the Church in his car wrapped in choir robes – the arsonist. Hilary described the awful state of the Church the following day but there were signs that all would be well – the clock was restarted and the upper section of the doom painting had been revealed. Rosemary Hayes told us of the aftermath and the hard work of the Church Wardens, Grant Buck and David Newland. Their financial skills negotiating the insurance claim, and fundraising and good financial management meant that repairs could get underway and we have the Church as it is today.

Paul Shakeshaft gave a most fascinating talk about the paintings and how unique and important they are. He showed us how we could tell that they are of very high quality and so would have been commissioned by some person or persons of standing and wealth – perhaps the Lord of one of the Manors or, maybe more likely, the nuns of Ickleton Priory. Paul went on to take us through the meaning of the paintings and what they show and how it was probable that there had been other paintings above the arches on the opposite south wall.

Finally, Lewis Duke explained the work that now needs to be done to conserve the paintings for the future, the cost and how much, after grant applications which hopefully will be successful, will need to be raised by the community. Thanks to everyone who kindly made donations on the day.

It is, of course, thanks to past donations to the village archive that the Society was able to mount such an extensive exhibition about the fire, the wall paintings and the history of the Church in our community.

Display in the Telephone Box – for the past few weeks the display was inspired by Open Gardens but it is about to change and will focus on the Church, the fire and the discovery of the wall paintings.

Cambridgeshire Association for Local History – the Ickleton Society is a member of the Association and this means that our members can attend their lectures for just £1 on each occasion. They are held on the first Saturday of the month at St John's Hall, Hills Road / Blinco Grove, Cambridge from 2.15 pm and to around 4.15 pm and refreshments are provided. There is a break over the summer and the next talk is in October when Mary Burgess will talk about changes to East Road, Cambridge over the last 70 years.

The November meeting is their awards ceremony and we are delighted to have been told that we are to receive another award for our **“Ickleton and the Great War”** book!

Following the award by the British Association for Local History to Rachel Radford (August 1999) a second award has been bestowed upon The Ickleton Society for their World War I project, this time by The Cambridge Association for Local History for “making a major contribution to the county's history”. In their words - “the judges of the Book Awards have read a lot of publications on Cambridgeshire villages in the Great War over the last few years, but we all felt that yours was exceptional”.

Very well done to Glynis Hammond and Rachel Radford as authors of the book, and also to members of the committee for their supporting roles in proof reading, photography & publicity. Glynis and Rachel will be presented with the award on 2nd November at a ceremony in Cambridge.
